**Baptist Missionary Convention.**  
 London, Wednesday Oct. 21.  
 The Baptist Convention met this morning at 9 a.m.  
 The mission in Manitoba was the first subject up for consideration. A letter was read by the Secretary from Rev. A. McDonald, at present laboring in that field, giving a very cheerful and encouraging account of his work there. It was deemed advisable by the Convention to send another missionary to the field, and already a considerable sum of money has been raised towards that object.  
 At the afternoon meeting the following officers were elected for the Home Missionary Convention:—Charles Raymond, Guelph, President; Rev. W. Stewart, B. A., Secretary; George Bell, Treasurer.

An earnest discussion ensued on the desirability of appointing an evangelist to visit the different fields hitherto neglected, but where there are scattered families of Baptists eager to join in their favorite form of worship and organize Churches. A resolution was passed leaving it in the hands of the Board to carry out this object.

In order to raise the funds necessary, guarantees were immediately volunteered, led by Rev. Dr. Castle, of Toronto, and \$800 was found in a very short time. From the tone manifested there will be no difficulty in getting the required sum, about \$1,000.  
 The following visiting brethren were then introduced:—Rev. Mr. Bottrell, lately arrived from England, who is to officiate in the new church at the east end of this city; the Rev. Dr. Jewett, a missionary just returned from India, who was received with great applause, and gave an interesting account of his labor in the far east; Bro. Ayer and Bro. Lenny, from the Eastern Baptist Convention; Bro. Youhill, a delegate from the New York State Convention; Rev. Mr. Gudenbager, from the Colored Baptist Convention of Amherstburg; Rev. C. Goodspeed, lately settled in Woodstock; and others.

After the appointment of delegates to the several Conventions, the meeting adjourned.  
 The annual missionary meeting was held this evening.
