**THE WEATHER PROPHET.**

Toronto, Sept. 5-11 a.m.—An important  
depression which has developed during the day  
is now central over Dakota, and pressure is in-  
creasing rapidly in the far Northwest.  
Heavy showers occurred in many portions of  
Ontario and Quebec during last night. To-  
night rain is falling from Qu'Appelle to Win-  
nipeg; also in southern Ontario. Showers have  
also been experienced in the Maritime Provinces.  
Minimum and maximum temperatures: Cal-  
gary, 42-52; McMillan, 32-54; Minne-  
sota, 41-51; Winnipeg, 38-78; Toronto,  
62-78; Montreal, 62-77; Quebec, 56-77; Hal-  
fax, 48-64. Cautionary signals have been  
ordered for Lake Superior.

**TODAY'S PROBABILITIES.**  
Toronto, Sept. 6-1 a.m.—The indications  
for the next 24 hours are for the lower lakes  
region (covering the peninsula and as far  
east as Belleville) are: Easterly winds  
during the day; fair and warm in the northern

**Poor Milk for the Hospital.**

The regular meeting of the Hospital  
Trust was held at 10 a.m. yesterday.  
Col. Lewis (chairman), Trustees Gilmore,  
Pardon and Complin and Medical Super-  
intendent Balfour were present when the  
business began. The report of the Super-  
intendent, showing that 19 patients had  
been admitted and 21 discharged since the  
last meeting, and that 51 were now in the  
Hospital, was read and filed. Attention  
was called by the Superintendent to the  
poor quality of milk that was being sup-  
plied to the institution. The Secretary was  
instructed to notify the contractor to have  
the milk up to the standard or lose his  
contract. A vote of thanks was tendered  
to the Seventh Fullers Band for their  
concert on Wednesday evening at the  
Hospital. The Superintendent was handed  
\$15 15 to relieve any pressing want of the  
Hospital. The money was collected in one  
of the poor-boxes.
