# Railway Men Indignant

How They Failed to Get the Back Wages That Was Their Due.

Deprived of Their Just Rights by Mr. Essery's Autocratic Conduct.

Just before Mayor Spencer retired from office the Cleveland syndicate, who sought to control the London and Port Stanley Railway, were compelled by him and the aldermen of that day to put up \$25,000 as a guarantee of good faith. The money was put up in the Molsons Bank in the usual way, and that strong bank, with millions of capital at its back, guaranteed its safety. When Mr. Essery was elected mayor he pretended that the bank's certificate was not good enough, and, to the amusement of every business man in the city, who knew that a chartered bank's certificate of money held on behalf of a city or an individual is as good as gold, he demanded that the deposit should take the shape of "cold cash." Chiefly through the crying down of their credit by Mr. Essery and his agents the syndicate were unable to finance the new international company and the \$25,000 forfeit became the property of the city, as in any case it would have become in the result of failure to keep the bargain.

It was intended by Mayor Spencer and the Council that this \$25,000 should go towards indemnifying the city and the railway employes against any loss that might be sustained through the failure of the Cleveland syndicate to make the rail-

Many railway men-none of them well off-trusted to this understanding, and, with Mr. Essery's cognizance, allowed their pay to get behind. The syndicate was unable to pay them their wages, and some of them suffered privations in consequence. They had the strongest of claims on the \$25,000, and out of that large sum the very first payment should have gone for their long over-due wages. Indeed, the interest handed over to the city by the bank would have more than paid them all. But Mr. Essery was so anxious to boast of his powers in collecting the money in his own way-no better than that of the business men who laughed an his lack of knowledge of business ways-that he resolutely de- Times from Vienna says that a letter has death struggle for Sir Oliver. clined to pay these men their just dues out of the money kept for that very purpose. Thus it is that these men, who had been for years trusted employes of the Grand Trunk Railway, were deprived of their over-due wages, and from that day to this Mr. Essery has refused to do them justice. In the circumstances, no railway man can vote further trust in Mr. Essery. He has proved that when given the power he is an autocrat of the worst stamp, ready to sacrifice the interests of the workers, if by so doing he can glorify himself.

# From Across the Sea

The Prince of Wales,

LONDON, Nov. 18 .-- For the first time in his long and not over-splendid public career the Prince of Wales finds himself the subject of zealous and even excited European attention. It is pretty late in the day for him to develop the tastes of a politician, let alone those of a statesman, but a much more utilitarian temperament than his might well be compelled to high ambitions by the situation in which he discovers himself. Vienna, Berlin, Rome and Paris alike are watching him as the principal object of interest at St. Petersburg, outweighing the importance of both the dead Czar in his coffin and the live Czar on his new throne. At the funeral of the late Czar it was noticed that the young Czar requested that the Prince of Wales should walk beside him, and the people generally are wondering what significance this may have.

Led a Double Life. LONDON, Nov. 18 .- The trial recently concluded here of the man Read, which resulted in his conviction for the murder of Florence Dennis, has disclosed the fact that for years the murderer has been leading a double life. Among his associates he was looked upon as a man of good reputation. He was employed as a cashier by the Docks Company, and lived quietly with his wife and family. To all appearance he was a good husband and father, but the evidence adduced at his trial show that he supported a second wife in one of the suburbs of London, and carried on a criminal intrigue with a married woman named Ayriss. He was also intimate with the latter's sister, Florence, and when she began to become troublesome he shot her to get her out of the way. He was an aspiring dramatist and song writer. The bodies of the dead were left unburied, and their presence has caused an outbreak of cholera. Many Christians are reported to have fled by secret paths across the Russian frontier. So far, adds the Times, there has been no official confirmation of this news.

To Suppress Betting. LONDON, Nov. 18 .- The excellent people who wish to suppress betting and other forms of gambling have had an interview with the Home Secretary, and have asked him to do it for them. They are organized under the name of the Anti-Gambling League, and their deputation to Mr. Asquith was headed by Canon Scott-Holland, a clergymrn of more energy than discretion. Their aim is to stop betting on the turf by a kind of side wind. A statute framed for other purposes is to be put in force. Canon Scott-Holland alleged, not untruly, that the prohibitions and penalties of the existing law fall more heavily on the poor than on the rich. Mr. Asquith replied that he has no wish to turn the Home Office into a branch of the Anti-Gambling League. He therefore declares for a new local veto, insisting that local authorities ought to have the power to prohibit racing or to license it under such conditions as they think fit. He warns them, however, that the law is in a very uncertain state. The courts have yet to interpret the statute authoritatively with reference to racecourse betting. Till then the league must proceed cautiously. Racing and betting on races are two of the most popular pursuits in this country. The turf is an immense evil, but abolishing the House of Lords would be a joke to abolishing the turf or betting on the turf. Mr. Asquith therefore contents himself with assuring Canon Scott-Holland that the law shall be enforced impartially when he knows what the law is.

A New Grouping. M. Jacques St. Cere cables from Paris to the New York Herald: "The new grouping of the great powers is becoming more clearly defined to Europe and the advances made by Lord Rosebery to France and Russia appear to be not merely a matter of chance, but a ripely matured plan to mask the defeat of the English policy in other combinations. Germany is deeply wounded by the change in England's policy and So why not enjoy it while you Russian grouping appears incredible can???????????! it must not, however, be forgotten that the young Czar is on the very best terms with his English relations, and that if an understanding should be arrived at with England it will be necessary for France to be

In the same way the terrible massacres of Christians in Asia Minor, where more than 6,000 Armenians have been atrociously butchered, arouses only the pity of the public, but not that of the governments of Europe.
