Great Britain Wishes No Advice From the United States.

Clash in Venezuela May Occur Any

Time-No Arbitration.

NEW YORK, April 4.-The Herald's Washington dispatch says: Great Britain will not tolerate any interference by the United States in the boundary dispute with Venezuela. This is the reply of the British Foreign Office to Ambassador Bayard's representation of

about a settlement of the boundary dis-

pute by a conference.

It is understood the British Government informed Ambassador Bayard that it would insist upon the boundary line surveyed in 1841 by Sir Robert Schomburg, and would not submit to arbitration in any form that would bring that line into question. It is claimed on behalf of Venezuela that the British position practically amounts to a declaration that if Venezuela will admit the claim of Great Britain to all the territory on the British side of Schomburg's line, arbitrations may be resorted to to determine whether still more territory shall not be taken by Great Britain. The United States Government has practically made the cause of Venezuela here own. A great deal will now depend upon the action of the two Governments in the disputed tertwo Governments in the disputed ter-ritory. Both Venezuela and Great Brit-ain have established small outposts along the Guyuni, which flows through the center of the territory in controversy. These outposts overlap each other, some of these established by Venezuela being nearer the territory which is admittedly British, than are some of the British outposts. The situation is such that a hostile clash may be brought

on at any time.

An atmosphere of spring is given to the issue by a delightful paper on "Flower Lore of New England Children," by Alice Morse Earle, Two papers of educational interest are "The Expressive Power of English Sounds," by Prof. Albert H. Tolman, and "The Basis of Our Educational System," by James Jay Greenough. One of the most appreciative tributes to Robert Louis Stevenson which has yet appeared comes from the pen of C. T. The Forum for April has for its leader a brilliant essay entitled "The Real Quintessence of Socialism," by Mr. W. H.
