## The Worst Feared

A Tragedy in Which a Former Londoner Figures.

The Sad Fate of Missionary Rijnhart and His Wife.

Reasons for the Belief That He Was Murdered and She Carried Off Captive.

The worst is feared as to the fate of Missionary Rijnhart, of Tibet, and his wife (Dr. Susie Carson, formerly of this city). Our Toronto correspondent sends us some additional particulars of the condition of affairs leading up to the tragedy referred to in these columns three weeks ago, which will be of much interest to Advertiser readers. The gentleman who was editor of The Tibetan, the little missionary paper which Mr. Rijnhart was instrumental in starting in Toronto, corresponded with him regularly when letters could pass between them. The last letter received from Mr. Rijnhart was dated Jan. 11, 1896, at Kumbum, which is in the Province of Amdo, in the northeastern part of Tibet. The country was then in the hands of the rebels. They had an army of 200,000, and were devastating towns and villages on all sides. Against this army the Chinese Emperor had sent an Imperial force of 6,000 men, which was completely annihilated by the rebels. Mr. Rijnhart, when on his way to Tibet, had arranged to send letters by couriers to the nearest point touched by the postal service, so that when if he were alive at the present time it is likely that he would, owing to the rebellion in the country, find it impossible to forward his letters. His wife, the cablegrams announcing his murder by the rebels is correct, and they are under the impression that owing to the medical training possessed by his wife, which was doubtless well known to the Tibetans, through being used in their behalf, that they would spare her life in their own interests, and that the information about her abduction by the rebels is also true. As the country is wild and difficult of access, it may be a long time before any intelligence of the ill-fated lady is obtained.

It may not be generally known that Mr. Rijnhart was not married to Dr. Carson till he had undertaken to walk from Toronto to Vancouver in his ardent desire to visit Tibet as a missionary, and had visited that distant country so little known in Christendom and so difficult of access to missionaries that he had succeeded in crossing its borders.

### DEATH OF A PRODIGY.

**A Baby 15 Months Old That Weighed 57 Pounds.**  
Springfield, Ill., Sept. 14.—The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. C. T. Tilch, of Athens, is dead of cholera morbus. The child was a prodigy. Though but 15 months old, it was 3 feet high and weighed 57 pounds, and was able to talk.

**BLEW OUT THE GAS.**  
Winning, Man., Sept. 15.—The Misses Armstrong, of Aiston, Ont., guests at the Manor House, blew out the gas in their room. They were found next morning unconscious. Medical assistance was summoned in time to save them.

**THROUGH A BRIDGE.**  
San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 15.—A train on the Mad River and Arcata road went through the Mad River bridge on Sunday. Six cars loaded with passengers dropped 30 feet into the dry bed of the river. Annie Holt and Sandy Cameron were killed, and ten others were seriously injured.

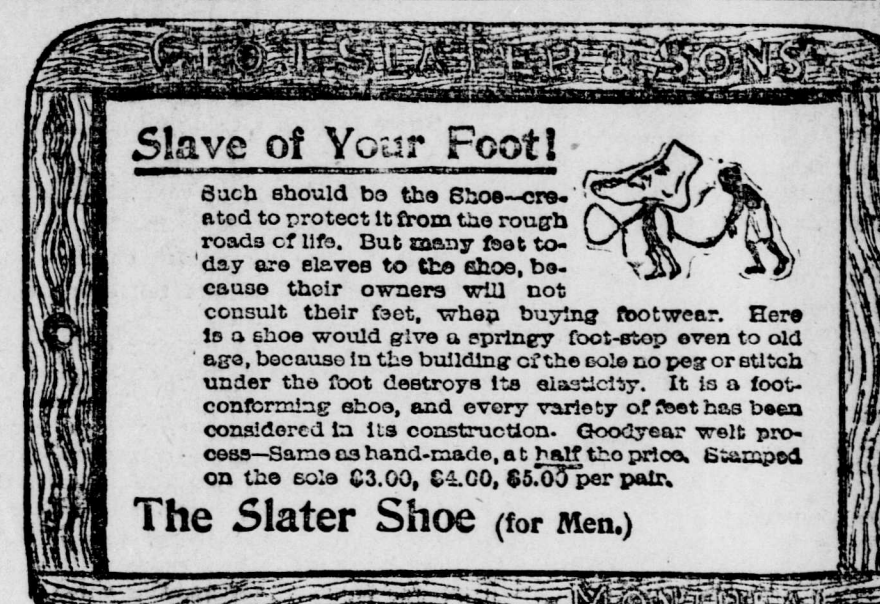
