This instructed them to add to the value of the goods purchased in bond, the customs or internal revenue duty leviable in the country where the goods are purchased, and which is collected in all cases by the foreign government concerned before the goods are allowed to go into consumption in such foreign countries. This matter is considered as having an important bearing on American importations into Canada.
