Beautiful Jerusalem Edifice To Be Reproduced in Paris.


All Its Graceful Architectural Details Are To Be Seen at the World's Exposition at the French Capital in 1900-A Stupendous Task Which Famous Builders Have Set Themselves to De.

The reproduction of the Mosque of Omar is one of the stupendous tasks which the Paris Exposition builders have set for themselves.

The Mosque of Omar, in Jerusalem, is

situated on ancient Mount Moriah, the site of Solomon's and Herod's temple. A member of the Palestine Exploration Society will superintend the building of the mosque and the Mohammedans will hold worship there daily. Great trouble will be taken to secure extreme accuracy and, as far as possible, the wonderful temple which the Armenians are always threatening to destroy in Jerusalem will

The entire inclosure of the Mosque of Omar in Jerusalem is called by the



THE MOSQUE OF OMAR.

Noble Sanctuary. About the middle of the inclosure is an almost rectangular platform, about 15 feet from the ground. In the middle of the platform of the original temple stands the main temple, the Mosque of Omar. The building is an octagon in shape and is covered by a light, artistically shaped dome, which is surmounted by a crescent.

Outside the mosque there are several small elegant praying places.

To the south of the platform is the second large temple, or mosque, called

Here are several handsome stainedclass windows, and one especially that has called for the admiration of thousands who have seen it. It is made of small transparent glass mosaics, wrought into exquisitely beautiful flowers and arabesques of variegated colors, harmoniously blending into each other.

This window has another peculiarity of a double set of designs, one set being visible at a certain distance from the window, and on stepping back two or three yards another and entirely different set of designs appears to the view.

CHILD GROWTH.

Make the Education Accord With 16. Not Oppose It.

Growth focuses for a time upon one set of organs or functions, then upon another, until the whole body is developed; but all parts of the body do not grow at one and the same time. The body grows first in length, and then in girth, in breadth and depth of chest, in breadth and height of forehead, in

breadth and length of face. To make a special application of this well-known fact of periodicity in physical growth, let us observe the development of the muscles of the arm. The muscles of the upper arm-those concerned in the functioning of the shoulder joint—are ripe and ready for training at least a year and one-half before the muscles of the fingers. The muscles of the shoulder mature for training six months before the muscles of the elbow, and these in turn five to eight months before the muscles of the wrist, which three to six months before the muscles of the fingers. When we insist that a child shall begin to write by means of the finger muscles only with a small pencil in narrow spaces on ruled paper or a slate we run directly counter to the principles of growth and development that nature has so plainly written in his constitution. Must not education, to be edueation at all, be in accord with these principles rather than in opposition to them? The child of 6 years, during the first days of his school life, chooses to make large, whole-arm movements rather than the minute movements of the finger muscles. At first he requires "almost an acre" of blackboard space in which to write a few sentences. We must train the large shoulder muscles before attempting to burden the tender, undeveloped finger muscles, which are really injured

by such too early strain and involved Thus we find in our best regulated kindergartens of to-day none of the finer work for the younger children. The young child is no longer required to take up the bead-stringing and pin-pricking exercises—at least not until his eyes and his finger muscles are ripe and ready for such training. In some of the most modern kindergartens the occupations and gifts are concerned with larger objects instead of those formerly used, which were of the smaller, more orthodox size-larger blocks, larger pencils, larger needles, larger beads and coarse string instead of fine thread .- Forum.
