THE HORSE SHOW IN NEW YORK

Came to a Brilliant Close Saturday Night—A Record-Breaker.

New York, Nov. 20.—The most successful of the fifteen horse shows held in this city came to a brilliant end Saturday night. It was the most successful in point of attendance, the quality of the horses, the beauty of the women, the splendor of their raiment—in fact, from every point of view.

The attendance for the week was about 75,000, and this in the face of the very bad weather on Tuesday, when the crowd was the smallest of the week. Society was loyal to the very end.

Lawson, Boston, 3 blue ribbons and \$650; H. N. Bain, Foughkeepsie, 1 blue ribbon; William J. Sampson, Youngstown, O., 4 blue ribbons; George Pepper, Toronto, Ont., 2 blue ribbons; Adam Beck, London, Ont., 2 blue ribbons.

LONDON WON IN A WALK

The Junior Championship of the Ontario Rugby Football Union.

The Nationals' First Defeat Was London's Greatest Victory—A Brilliant Game.

The London Juniors are champions. By a complete victory over the Nationals at Tecumseh Park, Saturday afternoon, they established their claim to the championship in the Ontario Rugby Football Union. Not only did they win, but they defeated their opponents with such utter completeness that it made the Londoners present wonder how the Nationals ever gained the reputation for being a hustling, husky aggregation, whose strength and knowledge of the game caused them to be feared by those teams, who allowed themselves to be beaten before. This was the first defeat for the Nationals. It was London's most decisive victory.

Every one in London knew that a first-class team would represent them in the game. Everyone had full confidence in the team, but they knew also that the Kingston boys were fast and plucky players, and therefore they expected the local boys to have a hard fight for it. They were not disappointed. To read the score one would suppose that the Nationals were very easy. But London had to fight, strongly and cleverly, in order to overcome their swift opponents. Robinson, the Kingston hockey player, gained the applause and good-will of those present by his many brilliant plays. Others were not far behind him. As a team they did work such as made the success of the Londoners all the more gratifying. The victory was not the only pleasing feature of the game. Everything combined to make the day a happy one to Londoners. Fashion and beauty, the flickle followers of each other in the numbers of the representatives. Unlike previous contests this game was favored by the weather gods, and a glorious specimen of Canada's unrivaled autumn weather made more agreeable the pleasant task of cheering London to the championship.

The Nationals won the toss, and kicked with the wind, and without the ball ever passing London's line, it was rushed behind the goal, and London scored a touch-down, which was not converted. By clever and rapid following, Hobbs repeated this, and the score was 8 to 0 almost before the Kingston had rid themselves of the taste of the lemon juice. After the kick off there followed scrimmages, which resulted in Kingston fumbling, and London gained a rouse. Rapid repetitions of such work carried the score of 14-0 in London's favor by the end of the first half.

Shortly after the beginning of the second half Kingston's captain unfortunately wrenched his shoulder, and had to be carried from the field. Hobbs managed, by a magnificent run, to carry the ball through the goal line, and McNe converted making the score 20 to 0. Brilliant plays by Peel and Boyce, which were varied by some clever work by O'Brien and Robinson, of the Kingston, brought the score up to 31-0.

SOCIETY GIRL'S STRANGE STORY

Revolver Used to Compel Her to Marry a Negro.

Cut Off Her Hair and Dressed Her in Boy's Clothing—Granted a Divorce.

Toledo, Ohio, Nov. 20.—Ameda Harris, the society girl who eloped from her home in Weston with John Fletcher, colored, and was married to him in Monroe, Mich., was on Saturday granted an absolute divorce and restoration to her maiden name. On the witness stand Miss Harris told a harrowing tale of how she was induced to leave the church social at her home and at the point of a revolver was compelled to go with Fletcher. After they left the city Fletcher cut her hair and compelled her to don his clothing, and after a two days' tramp they reached Monroe and she was given her own clothing and they were married. She then started away with Fletcher and they were found at Station Island by the girl's father a week later. She says Fletcher told her she would be killed if she attempted to escape.

Fletcher did not appear at the trial. The girl is only 16 years old and her parents are wealthy.

THE GAME LAWS

Facts of Interest to Hotel, Restaurant and Cold Storage People.

The following sections from the Ontario game laws may prove interesting to those engaged in the business of cold storage, and to hotels and restaurant keepers:

The chief warden may issue to any person or corporation engaged in the business of cold storage of perishable articles a license authorizing such person or corporation to keep during the close season in any year and until the commencement of the next open season any of the animals or birds hereinafter mentioned, upon the following conditions:

1. That the chief warden and any warden or deputy warden shall at all times be allowed to inspect any cold storage premises owned or kept by the licensee and all game kept therein.
2. There shall be recorded in a book kept for the purpose and open to the inspection of the chief warden and of all wardens and deputy wardens, the name and residence of each person from whom game is received to be so kept, the quantity and description of such game and the dates at which the same or every part thereof is received and delivered, together with the name of the person to whom the same is delivered.
3. That written notice shall be sent to the chief warden of all game brought for cold storage during the close season.

Application for such licenses shall be verified by a declaration in which the applicant shall declare that he will comply with the above conditions, and will not knowingly permit any violation of this act with regard to any game to be kept in cold storage, as aforesaid. The above declaration shall be made by the owner of the cold storage premises, or in case of a corporation, by the manager or other officer in charge of the business.

Any such license or permit shall supply for, or as part of any need for, which a charge is made, any of the birds or animals hereinbefore mentioned, no matter where killed or procured, during any period in which the sale of such birds or animals is prohibited, except by license to be issued by the chief warden for any one close season upon application verified by statutory declaration of the owner or manager of such hotel, restaurant or club specifying the game to be so supplied, the place where the same then is.

No license under this section shall be issued to any person, or to any corporation employing any person who to any game to be kept in cold storage, as aforesaid. The above declaration shall be made by the owner of the cold storage premises, or in case of a corporation, by the manager or other officer in charge of the business.

The fee to be paid for each license issued under this section shall be the sum of \$5, or such smaller sum as the board of fish and game commissioners may from time to time determine.

GROWING TIME IN THE DOMINION

Large Increase in Circulation of Government \$1 and \$2 Notes—Marked Increase Shown by the Trade Returns.

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—One of the most unmistakable signs of a growing time is the circulation of Dominion notes, that is, the government one and two dollar notes. From a statement prepared by the finance department, the following will show the increase which has taken place for the month of October since 1934:

October, 1934	\$7,031,368
October, 1935	7,295,368
October, 1936	7,533,712
October, 1937	7,940,620
October, 1938	8,612,602
October, 1939	9,421,355

It will therefore be seen that the circulation for October last was \$909,233 greater than for October in the previous year and \$2,500,000 greater than in 1934.

The trade figures for the first quarter of the present fiscal year also show another satisfactory evidence of the prosperity of the country. The aggregate trade for the country in that time has increased by over \$12,000,000, and the revenue by over \$1,000,000, as compared with the first quarter in 1938.

This was also a record-breaker. For October alone the increase in revenue from customs was over \$500,000.

The increase in the exports of animals and their produce for the four months was over \$5,000,000, as compared with the same time last year.

SEIZED HER EIGHT TRUNKS

Chicago Woman Arrested in Montreal, Charged With Fraud—Said to Have With Her Gems and Jewelry Worth \$50,000.

Montreal, Nov. 20.—Mrs. Evangelina O'Neill, of Chicago, was arrested Saturday afternoon at the Windsor Hotel on a charge of fraud, involving the possession of diamonds, precious stones and jewelry valued at \$50,000.

It is stated that Mrs. O'Neill, who is well known in Chicago, obtained possession of these valuables through a legal proceeding of some kind, and that she immediately took the first train for Canada.

A local detective here was informed that Mrs. O'Neill was supposed to be in Montreal en route for Europe. He had no difficulty in finding her. She was registered under her own name at the Windsor.

Through J. N. Greenshields he applied to Judge Lafontaine for a warrant. Judge Lafontaine was at first disposed to refuse the warrant, assuming that cases of this kind seldom held good before a grand jury, and that a civil process would serve the same end. Mr. Greenshields urged that a capias could not be taken against a woman in a civil court, and that arrest was the only remedy available. The warrant was accordingly issued and served by a constable high constable Mr. Lambert. In the meantime eight seizures before judgment were taken out on the trunks owned by Mrs. O'Neill, which were at the Windsor.

It was decided that professors, instructors or anyone in the employment of any of the judges should be ineligible to compete for the prizes, and also that the essays should be forwarded to the secretary not later than Saturday, Jan. 6.
