BLOWS DID NOT CAUSE DEATH

Wounds Found by Doctors Would Not Have Been Fatal Had Ninham Been Healthy.

Not since Walter Herbert answered "Guilty" to the charge of murder has a criminal case taken such a surprising turn as did the MoArthur case at the assizes this morning. At the conclusion of the case for the crown, Judge Lount took the case from the jury, and discharged the prisoner. The main reason for his action was that when the medical experts themselves were unable to decide wether death was due to blows, excitement. liquor or exertion, it was not a case upon which a jury could be called to

decide. Judge Lount's action has a direct parallel in the course pursued in the Kavanagh merder case over two years ago, when Chief Justice Meredith stopped the progress of the case and took the matter from the hands of the jury. On that occasion Judge Lount was engaged as counsel for the defense. In the present case much credit is due the counsel for the prisoner, Mr. J. F. Faulds, for his able conduct of the defense. In cross-examination he

brought out many important points, and even had the defense been obliged to put in evidence, and the case gone the jury, the prisoner's chances would have been considered as very favorable. Mr. Faulds was assisted in the case by his partner, Mr. R. M. C.

JUDGE'S ADDRESS TO THE JURY. It was a few minutes before 11 o'clock when Mr. Clute announced that the crown had no further evidence to offer. Mr. Faulds asked for five minutes' consultation with his partner, which was granted. On his return, Judge Lount turned to the jury and addressed them to the following effect: He said that it was the duty of the

crown in a criminal trial to make out a case which would prove beyond doubt the guilt of the person charg-ed. The crown must prove that Mcdence had been carefully presented and | body. all the facts possible to be obtained had been laid before he court. Having had been laid before he court. Having considered the evidence of Drs. Neu and Waugh, said Judge Lount, he did not think the case one to be submitted to the jury for their finding. If the testimony of John Charles were true, a most brutal and cruel assault had been made upon the deceased Indian, but it was necessary to prove that that but it was necessary to prove that that assault caused the death of Ninham. The jury could not be allowed to speculate on the matter. The doctors had proved that Ninham suffered from a disease of the heart which might cause death at any moment. Judg Lount said he himself would not undertake, either as judge or jury, to conscientiously say that the blows in-flicted by the prisoner caused the death of Ninham. When even the medical experts could only conjecture

the cause of death, the jury could not be expected to determine the fact. Hu-man life is too valuable to be taken on conjecture. For the reasons assigned, his lordship directed that the jury find a verdict of not guilty. The verdict was recorded as the judge had directed.

THE PRISONER DISCHARGED. "Are there any other charges against this prisoner?" asked Judge Lount. "None, my lord," replied Mr. Clute. At the judge's command the prisoner stood up in the dock. In discharging him, Judge Lount said that he did not know whether of not Charles' story

Reported Killing of Converts | Fears That the Ex-Premier Is in Szechuan Is Confirmed-

Pekin, Sept. 19.-The French minister, through Wang Wen Shao, associate minister of foreign affairs and successor to Li Hung Chang as plenipotentiary, has sent word to the court at the summer palace that the French consul at Chengtu, Province of Szechuan, confirms the reports of the Boxer uprising at that place, the massacre of converts and the conflict between the Lantern Society and the Imperial troops. The foreign board disclaims all knowledge of the trouble. It is learned that the prefect and the Neihtai (provincial judge), who are the third and fourth highest provincial officials, are implicated in the disturbances. The Neihtai's son is the Boxer leader. The uprising was organized by an official who was blacklisted for

Shansi. The throne has strongly commanded the officials of Szechuan to suppress the rebellion in that province. The Boxer attack on Cheng Tu Fu began Sept. 15. The attacking party was driven back and the gates of the city were closed and guarded by troops. Soldiers quelled the disorder within the city. A Large Number Starting Out From Roumania.

It Is Said They Decline to Labor on the Farms.

London, Sept. 19. - In a dispatch from Bucharest, Roumania, dated Sunday, Sept. 14, a correspondent of the Daily Express says the emigration fever among the Jews of Roumania still continues, and that within the last three months 4,000 Jews have left the country. Tonight, the correspondent goes on, a party of 350 left for Canada and the United States, and small parties of Jews leave the larger towns of the country almost daily. Although the reason given by the emigrants for leaving is their inability to obtain work, the Jews steadily re-fuse to take up farm labor. Proof of this is found in the fact that within the last three years Roumania has paid for outside Bulgarian labor something like \$3,000,000, which might have to the Jews if they would only turn their hands to the labor of harvesting. Bulgarian laborers, the correspondent concludes, are well housed and excellently fed while working on Roumanian farms.
