CITIZENS RISE AGAINST ENGINEER'S INITIATIONS

Petition Against Many Proposed Improvements.

Board of Works Seeks to Overcome Many Difficulties.

Dilly-dallying over a grist of small matters kept the board of works in session until 10:30 last night, the rate at which the aldermen transacted business being so slow that had they any important questions to deal with they would not have been home before midnight. Ald. Wyatt was in the chair, and the other members in attendance were Ald. Gerry, Cooper and Abram, Engineer Graydon, Secretary Bell and Ald. Judd, acting mayor.

A way out of a difficulty was suggested to a number of ratepayers who waited on the board in regard to the laying of a sewer on Piccadilly street, between Maitland and Adelaide streets. The members of the deputation were anxious to have the work done. The sooner the better they would be pleased, but there was this obstacle in the way. They could not get sufficient names to the petition, and what made it still more aggravating, those who would not sign the document for the work would not take any steps against it should the petition receive enough names. There the matter stood. As a way out of the predicament the engineer suggested that the petition be initiated, in which case the ratepayers who refused to sign the petition kept to their word, the laying of the sewer will not meet with any opposition. This was approved by the board.

WANT OPEN ROADWAY.

Ald. Wyatt and Ald. Gerry regretted that they had seen Mr. D. H. Gillies with reference to the proposed closing of the property on the east side of Adelaide street, which would cut off the Columbia Handle Company's means of reaching the latter. A proposition was made to cut off the east side of the land be set apart for a roadway, the city to buy one-third, the company one-third, and Mr. Gillies to give one-third. The proposition was asked for the land, which would make the outlay for the city and company \$166 each. Mr. Gillies was not inclined to accept the offer, although he did not positively refuse. Another local man who will be consulted as to what powers the corporation would have to expropriate the land in the event of Mr. Gillies' refusal.

ANOTHER DIFFICULTY.

Messrs. Henry Rymill and Alfred Jackson comprised another deputation which waited on the board. They are residents of Oxford street, between Maitland and William streets, and they wanted to know why the sewerage was not laid in that block last year had not been laid. Engineer Graydon's reply was that the sewer was not constructed for the reason given at the time that the sewers on William and Maitland streets, into either of which the proposed sewer would have to empty, were already overtaxed, and also because there was not sufficient fall to the street. If laid under these conditions the sewers would simply back up into cellars and the city would be held for damages. Failing in their petition, the ratepayers, he said, could get relief by petitioning for a sewer to go to Colborne street, where it would have a sufficient outlet. Mr. Rymill and others objected to this proposal, as this, and had refused to sign such a petition, as the ratepayers between Thornton avenue and Maitland street would be exempt, a sewer already being laid in front of their property. Thus the whole cost would fall on the others in the two blocks, which was looked upon as unfair. Something had to be done, Mr. Rymill said, as the cellars had from two and a half to four feet of water in them, and the board of health might find it necessary to take a sewer to the street. The matter was laid over for a week.

DON'T WANT INITIATIONS.

Engineer Graydon's initiation of permanent improvements does not seem to meet with general approval, judging by the number of petitions received against walks and pavements. Sufficiently signed petitions were in the hands of the clerk against the bituminous pavements proposed for Talbot

STREET SCRAPING.

A tender for the scraping of the streets from the Front Street City Paying Company the figures being \$2,398. Its acceptance will be requested. Done by the day last year, the work cost \$3,315, and only half of the streets were done. The specifications for this year include 26 miles of streets, and with the tender so low, Mr. Graydon strongly advised that it be accepted. Another local man who was going to tender told the engineer that his figure would be about \$7,000, but as he understood the appropriation for streets would not be more than \$6,000, he did not think it worth his while to submit his price.

Other tenders accepted were as follows: Hardware, Cowan & Co.; iron corners for wall, Gibson Bros.; Portland cement, S. H. Craig; glazed pipe, London Builders' Supply Company; concrete pipe, divided between E. North and J. Anthony; broken stone, W. S. Cotton, at \$1.50 a cord for the whole city, which was \$1.95 a cord less than the next lowest tender.

Baldwin & Baldwin give a satisfactory price for the first and second sweeping, the contract for cleaning the block pavements will be awarded to them.

The pay sheet for the week amounted to \$175.07.

U. S. SNAKE CATCHERS

Government Examines Six Candidates for Peculiar Position.

Washington, March 13.—Six candidates for the position of snake catcher to the division of reptiles and batrachians of the National Museum presented themselves today before a civil service commission and were examined as to their knowledge of snakes and called upon to prove that their prowess as snake catchers was not mythical.

The fortunate one of the six who strove for the peculiar berth in the Government's herpetological department will receive a compensation of \$50 a month.

One of the candidates was a young man, not more than 20, a bewhiskered countryman, laid claim to the office on account of the presentation of a photograph showing his body covered with snakes.

ORANGE LODGE REPORTS

The South Bruce District Abolished—Election of Officers.

Wingham, Ont., March 12.—The Provincial Grand Orange Lodge, Ontario West, on reassembling yesterday morning, received a deputation from the town council, by whom official welcome was extended.

A proposition was adopted to have the Orange Order represented at the Toronto, Ottawa and London exhibitions.

The county lodges of Bruce were rearranged by abolishing the South Bruce district and the two Orange districts of that county to be hereafter known as Center and North Bruce, and the salary of the grand secretary was further increased by \$50.

A resolution was passed to the effect that all householders should be placed on public school lists until they put in application for transfer to separate schools, and that secret ballots be used at all school elections.

The afternoon session opened with the exciting subject at present engrossing public attention, the notorious Gandy case. It was brought before Grand Lodge by a resolution moved by John Hewitt and seconded by Lieut.-Col. Scott. The most searching inquiries were made into the affair and the parties brought to justice. The action was carried by copies forwarded to the Government, the press and leaders of the political parties of the province.

The grand master was accorded the privilege of taking a free trip at the expense of the Grand Lodge to the next triennial Orange Council, to be held in Dublin.

The election of officers followed, resulting in nearly all the old ones being elected by acclamation: J. McMillan, Toronto, grand master; Lieut.-Col. Scott, Walkerton, deputy grand master; E. T. Essery, London, junior deputy grand master; H. C. Dixon, grand chaplain; Ed. Clarke, M.P., grand treasurer; William Lee, Toronto, grand secretary; Richard H. Watson, Toronto, grand lecturer; William White, Mitchell, grand director of ceremonies. The usual large number of deputy grand chaplains were appointed. W. M. Fitzgerald was elected assistant secretary, and John Hewitt, of Toronto, and W. J. Thompson, Mitchell, auditors.

Brantford was selected for the next annual meeting.

Those sufficiently petitioned against will be inspected by the engineer, and their condition reported upon. If dangerous they will be replaced with board walks, the entire cost of which will have to be borne by the ratepayers. The petitions insufficiently signed were against walks on the east side of Maitland street, between Grey and Hill streets, and on the east side of Adelaide street, between Lorne and Dufferin avenues.

On the advice of the engineer the council will be recommended to initiate five-foot walks for the north side of Elmwood avenue, between Eldon street and Marley Place, and the east side of Rectory street, between the M. J. line of the G. T. R. and the St. Marys line. When the exception to the small piece, the entire east side of Rectory street, from Dundas street to the Hamilton road, has cement walks.
