#### TO MAKE PURE IRON

Iwo University of Wisconsin Men Discover . Valuable Process. Madison, Wis., April 19.-Prof. C. F. Burgess and Carl Hambouchin of the college of engineering of the University of Wisconsin have discovered a cost. By the new discovery, which is the result of three years of research, the product can be made for 1 cent a pound. The process is similar to that used in refining copper, an electric current taking the impure iron from the plate and despositing it in a pure state on another plate.

The pure iron has properties not possessed by ordinary iron or steel. On account of its electrical properties it is a valuable material for the construc tion of electrical apparatus, and i furnishes the means for making special steel alloys of great strength and hard-
