The Adult Bible Class Movement

Address By Mr. Matthew Parkinson

In the First Presbyterian Church

Last Night.

Mr. Matthew Parkinson, of Toronto,
spoke on "The Adult Bible Class
Movement" in the First Presbyterian
Church, last evening, and delivered a
very interesting address. There was a
large attendance. A male choir led the
singing.

Mr. Parkinson took as his text, "It
is high time to wake out of sleep"
(Romans, xiii., 11-12). He referred to
the marvelous progress that had been
made in material wealth and power
during the nineteen centuries since
these words were written.

The world had been brought to-
gether.

It had shrunken until the remotest
parts of the earth were near at hand.

This was a great inspiration to the
church. The kingdoms of heathendom
were knocking at Christianity's very
doors. There were seething world
movements, in which the church must
take its place.

The Next Decade.

The speaker declared that he would
rather live during the next ten years
than for a hundred years the world
has ever seen, for in the next years the
will of God will be writ deep and large
on the world's history. Nations were
being born in a day. Nations that were
thought to be slumbering in apathy
and ignorance are awakening, and are
knocking at the doors of Christianity.

They were asking for schools, and uni-
versities, and religion, and western
civilization. The times were full of
meaning to the churches.

In Canada God had been touching
the hearts of men. The night of apathy
and sleep of the churches is past. The
men in the church must now awake
to service.

At Chalmers Church yesterday Rev.
Walter Moffat preached on the
"Twenty-Third Psalm." The sermon
was the first of a series. In the evening
Rev. Wm. Gauld, of Formosa,
spoke on the missionary work that is
being done there.

At the Marlford Street Latter Day
Saints' Church yesterday Elder R. B.
Howlett, who has returned home from
a missionary tour in the Manitoulin
Islands and in Algoma district, was
the speaker, and gave an interesting
recital of his varied experiences dur-
ing the past year. At the evening ser-
vice several baptisms were performed,
and Elder John Shields, who is a re-
turned delegate from the recent gen-
eral conference of the church in Mis-
souri, preached.

At the morning service at Talbot
Street Baptist Church, Mr. Matthew
Parkinson, of Toronto, preached, speak-
ing in the interest of Bible
schools, and the movement now on
foot to establish properly organized
adult Bible classes in every church for
regular Bible study and active service.

The speaker asserted his unwavering
faith in the old Bible—the best of all
books, and believes that this present
movement, if adopted by all the
churches, will to a great extent remedy
the difficulty now experienced in re-
taining the young people in the Bible
school and church work after they
reach the age of 18 years, or there-
abouts.

In the evening the pastor, Rev. A. J.
Vining again spoke to a full house.
Evidently the series of sermons on the
children of Israel, that has been main-
tained for some weeks past is not
growing monotonous. The lessons that
the pastor draws from these Old Testa-
ment characters are most timely,
and to the point. Last night the study
was concerning that wicked woman,
Jezebel, wife of Ahab, king of Israel
—the demonized woman—who was the
first person in history to resort to
religious persecution—to accomplish
her diabolical purposes.

Standing out in most striking con-
trast to this evil character was the
rugged, God-fearing Elijah, whose
plain, outspoken denunciation of sin
struck terror to the heart of Ahab, and
Elijah's successful challenge to the
prophets of Baal proved the truth for
which the prophet stood: "The Lord
he is God. The Lord he is God."

The choice as to whether we will serve
him must be made today, the same as
in the days of old. The pastor made a
very earnest appeal to those of his
hearers who had not already made the
right choice, to do so without delay.

An innovation was inaugurated in the
First Presbyterian Church last
night. After the evening service a re-
ception was tendered the men of the
congregation, at which coffee and
cake were served. There was a large
crowd in attendance, and a very pleas-
ant time was had.

SUNDAY IN THE LONDON CHURCHES

At Wellington Street Methodist
Church yesterday morning, Mr. J. A.
Jackson, of Toronto, secretary of the
Provincial Sabbath School Association,
gave an excellent address concerning
the work that is being done throughout
the Province in connection with the
formation of adult Bible classes.

In the evening Rev. James Living-
stone preached an impressive sermon
on "Jesus, the Saviour of All," in which
he instanced many of Christ's miracles
to show how the sufferings of rich and
poor alike appealed to his compas-
sion.

During the service Miss Kathleen
Lanceley sang most acceptably.

Yesterday marked the opening of the
annual Anglican missionary campaign,
in which there was a general exchange
of pulpits.

At St. Paul's two special sermons
were preached, the one in the morning
on missionary work being delivered by
Archdeacon Forrester, of Hamilton,
and in the evening Rev. Canon Dunn
spoke.

Both services were very well at-
tended. Archdeacon Forrester spoke
along similar lines at St. James' Epis-
copal Church, South London, in the
evening.

Rev. Canon Tucker preached to a
large congregation at the Memorial
Church in the evening. Rev. Dyson
Hague preached in the morning. Rev.
Mr. Andrew preached in London Town-
ship and at Ilorton.

At the First Congregational Church
yesterday, Rev. D. S. Hamilton occu-
pied the pulpit at both services.

In the morning Mr. Hamilton spoke
on the "Body of Christ," in which he
showed how rapid has been the growth
crisis divisions among people, there is
still a unity of spirit among all, of
whom Christ is the head.

In the evening Mr. Hamilton spoke
on Joshua, pointing out the high cour-
age, devotion and determination which
he possessed, and which resulted in
his being chosen leader of his people.

The great need today, the speaker
thought, was for independent leader-
ship, and for men who can stand up
and discuss the great issues of the
country from a statesman's standpoint,
and not from the narrow view of the
petty politician.

Mr. Ernest Moule sang most accept-
ably at both services.

Mr. Matthew Parkinson, of Toronto,
spoke to a large audience of men at
the Auditorium yesterday afternoon in
connection with the movement to form
adult Bible classes. Mr. Parkinson
showed how rapid has been the growth
of the adult Bible classes in Toronto
and other cities, and urged the ex-
tension of the work in this city.

At Dundas Street Center Church
yesterday morning the preacher was
Rev. Fred Bell-Smith, of Winnipeg,
and he chose as his subject "Reconcil-
iation."
