Ottawa, April 22.—The chief engineer Ottawa, April 22.—The chief engineer of the marine department is leaving this afternoon for Niagara to see what measures can be taken to relieve the situation. The marine authorities state that they would be only too glad to send an icebreaker to Niagara if it were possible to do so. But the only Canadian boats which would at all be able to cope with the situation would be the powerful breakers which are at Quebec and which have been operating on a somewhat simhave been operating on a somewhat sin ilar job. That jam was broken by the icebreaker Montcalm. However, the boat is prevented from proceeding to Niagara by the fact that she would have to pass through the Canadian canals which are not yet opened, and cannot be on account of ice until about the first of May.
