# FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

## **BRISK MARKET** AND MANY BUYERS

Potatoes Offered in Large Quantities and Apple Market Gutted.

FRESH EGGS ARE SCARCE

A Great Demand For Dairy Products and the Supply Is Very Large.

Despite the bad roads and the disagreeable weather generally, there was a very good turnout at the local market this morning, and the business was brisk. A week's absence has given a fresh zest for marketing, and there was a very large turnout of buyers, and traders on the market were kept busy all the time. Potatoes were offered in very large quantities, a large number of loads of 30 or 40 hags being offered. The prices which ruled, however, of 50c to 60c, and single bags as high as 65c, was too much for bags as high as 65c, was too much for the demand. It is reported that whole carloads are being shipped from Mount Brydges at 40c a bag, and there is little doubt that the price will have to come down before there will be any great de-mand.

Apple Market Gutted.

Apples have been offered in such quantities for some time now that the market seems to have been glutted, and though the quality of the fruit offered is very good there is little demand. They are still selling at 40c to 90c a bag, and from Poultry Plentiful.

Poultry was fairly plentiful today, and there was a very brisk demand. Turkeys were selling at 15c to 16c per lb; spring I2c; old fowl sold at 8c to 9c, but there was little demand.

Butchers' meats showed little change. There was a very fair demand, but little change in prices. Dressed hogs were quite plentiful, and there was a very brisk demand. Some sold as high as brisk demand. Some sold as high \$10.50 and as low as \$10, but the majority of the supply went for \$10.25.

Dairy Products. Dairy products were in great demand. There was a fair supply of butter, and it found a very ready sale, crocks bringing 4c to 25c at wholesale, and 26c at retail; rolls sold for 25c to 26c, and retailed at Strictly fresh eggs sold at 30c. were practically unprocurable even at there was a very good sale, though no change in prices are to be noted.
