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W.C.T.U. OPPOSE ANY GRANTS FOR NEW BATTLESHIPS

White Slavery and Liquor Traffic Are Two Great Evils of Today.

ORGANIZATION GROWING

Mrs. Thornley Named Convenor of the Committee on Appropriations.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Stratford, Oct. 7. — "The W. C. T. U. does not favor the granting of millions of dollars for warships that may never be used," said Mrs. Gordon, of Ottawa, in her report on "Work Among the Soldiers," given at the 36th annual meeting of the W. C. T. U. here today.

She also stated that Canada is trying to rival the older countries in the matter of giving the boys a military training, this being smoothed over by claiming that it gives them a physical training which they perhaps otherwise would not get. A splendid move already made was the doing away with the canteen by Hon. Sam Hughes, which representatives of the union found to be in accord with a great many of the soldiers at military camps.

Over 300 delegates from all parts of the Province are present.

Names Committees.

One of the first items of business was the appointment of committees, the convenors being as follows: Resolutions, Mrs. Cameron, Toronto; plan of work, Mrs. Pugsley, Toronto; registration, Mrs. Stacey, Toronto; transportation, Mrs. Gray, Toronto; credentials, Mrs. Dettlor, North Bay; and Mrs. Britton, Gananoque; appropriations, Mrs. Thornley, London; courtesies, Mrs. Gordon, Ottawa.

"Two great evils are rampant in this Province, the liquor evil and white slavery," declared Mrs. S. B. McKee, of Barrie, the past president. "I do not hold the Christian people responsible for the latter, but I do for the liquor evil, and white slavery is a natural sequence of it. If the Christian men of Ontario say 'no' to the liquor evil, there will be no liquor evil."

Splendid Reports.

The main item of business for the remainder of the day was the consideration of reports handed in by the different superintendents, the first being by Mrs. M. E. McGillivray, of Ottawa, who dealt with the flower mission department, in which 25 counties reported 80 unions having taken up the work. Thousands of bouquets, texts and periodicals had been distributed, while \$738.89 had been collected.

A remarkable address was that given by Mrs. M. Hyslop, the provincial organizer, in which she dealt with the successes and failures met with in her work. In her travels she had visited some 80 towns and organized or revived unions in Fenelon Falls, Galt, Waterloo, York, Hamilton, Falmouth, Ottawa, Wilburton and Stouffville.

Prison Reform.

The report on "Prison Reform and Police," by Mrs. Cunningham, of Owen Sound, showed that the work of the W. C. T. U. has become a distinctive feature in the police courts of Ontario.

Mrs. Kate Maxwell, of Windsor, strongly advocated the employment of school nurses to teach scientific temperance to the young.

Notices of motion were given that amendments to the constitution will be before the convention, to the following effect:

1. That Local Temperance Leagues of at least fifty members shall be entitled to representation at the Provincial convention.

2. That leagues of at least twenty members be entitled to representation at county conventions.

Treasurer's Report.

Mrs. B. O. Britton, of Gananoque, provincial treasurer, in her annual report, showed the total receipts to date, \$3,230.12, while the disbursements only totalled \$1,715.36, leaving a balance of \$1,474.57.

Provincial Corresponding Secretary Mrs. Dettlor, of North Bay, stated that there were 7,671 members on the roll, although a number of unions had not turned in their reports. The amount raised by the various unions was \$23,836.42.

Cattle Dealers Holding For Rise

HALF OF ULSTER STRONGLY FAVORS COME RULE BILL

Right Hon. H. Samuel Says the Whole Problem Is One of Religion.

WELCOME A SETTLEMENT

Government Anxious To End the Trouble, But Unionists Want Policy Abandoned.

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—In a speech before the members of the Canadian Club today, Right Hon. Herbert Samuel, British Postmaster-General, declared that the old spirit of fussy, unnecessary interference by Downing street, in the domestic affairs of the dominions, had disappeared.

With the coming of the democratic spirit in the constitution and policies of the old country. In the old country they recognized that Canada was not an appendage, but as much an integral part of the empire as Great Britain herself, and the loyalty they expected was not loyalty from Canada to Britain, but equal loyalty from Britain and Canada to the empire, and the crown was the symbol of the empire.

Uster Situation.

Turning to Ulster, Mr. Samuel said that the first thing to know about the Ulster problem was that it was not a religious problem, it was a political problem relating to one-half of Ulster. Ulster sent thirty-five members to Westminster, of whom eighteen were in favor of home rule. The problem in effect was the northern election, where there was a large, prosperous, homogeneous population violently opposed to home rule, and sending seven members to the Imperial Parliament. There was no religious element of the kind if all Ireland were Protestant. It was the religious difficulty essentially which has made the political difficulty. The Irish Parliament has been absolutely barred by law from touching the religious rights of any individual, or conferring any favors or imposing any disabilities on anyone on the ground of religion.

Not Opposed.

The Unionist leaders in Great Britain had declared that they would not oppose home rule if a general election resulted in a majority in its favor, but Sir Edward Carson and his colleagues said that they would never result to a general election. The Imperial Government would eagerly welcome a settlement by consent. Mr. Asquith had often said so, and Mr. Redmond had signified his agreement to a general election. The only consent to a settlement, which involved the abandonment of the Government policy. Unhappily, the prospects of a settlement by consent did not seem very bright, and seemed far off. Yet for thirty years Ireland, apart from the Ulster Unionists, had unwaveringly declared for home rule.

As part from the Irish members there was a majority in the Imperial Parliament of sixty for home rule.

LIVE STOCK AND PRODUCE MARKET

LIVE STOCK.

TORONTO, Union Stock Yards, Oct. 7.—The run here yesterday totalled 72 cars, containing 1,402 cattle, 122 calves, 606 hogs, and 406 sheep and lamb.

The run today was slightly below average, but with the stock left over from yesterday, trade continued brisk at unchanged figures. The quality of the shipments was also very good, with the exception of the cattle remaining unchanged. Stockers and feeders remained firm with the opening day, all offerings finding a ready sale. Sheep and lambs continued firm, and were a good trade. Cattle, except moderately Cables from Liverpool are steadier, being affected by unfavorable reports from the Argentine. The world's visible supply of wheat showed an increase of 15 millions for the week, as against an increase of 11 millions a year ago. Wheat prices for futures were firmer, and cash wheat 1/2c higher at Bay ports.

Flour—Ontario wheat flours, 90 per cent, made of new wheat, quoted at \$3.50 to \$3.55, seaboard, and at \$3.60 to \$3.65 locally. Manitoba's—First patents, in 48-lb bags, \$5.30; do, seconds, \$4.80; strong bakers', in 48-lb bags, \$4.60.

Peas—Nominal at 55c to 56c, outside. Barley—52c to 54c, outside.

Corn—The market is dull; No. 3 American corn quoted nominal at 75c, c.i.f. Montreal.

Rye—Prices nominal at 60c to 62c per bushel.

Buckwheat—Prices nominal at 52c to 53c.
