Use of Country Estates and City Houses Extended to Military Authorities by Patriotic Canadians in All Parts of Dominion.

SEND UNSKILLED MEN TO FIGHTING LINE AND BRING OTHERS TO WORK

Proposal of Munition Manufacturers, Who Object to Proposed French Law.

Paris, June 5.—The Chamber of Deputies yesterday discussed a proposed law transferring from the auxiliary service to the active service every mobilized man capable of performing military duty at the front.

The heads of industries manufacturing war material have forwarded a protest against the withdrawal of men from work on which skill and experience is needed to complete contracts for the Government. It is pointed out in the protest that many men able to fight are driving automobiles attached to Government departments, who can easily be replaced. In this connection it was proposed to leave skilled workmen to make shells and guns, and bring back others from the front more useful in the manufacture of war munitions, and replace them by unskilled men now in the auxiliary service.

NOTE TO GERMANY MAY GO BY NIGHT

President Making Last Corrections—No Warning to Americans in Berlin.

Washington, June 5.—President Wilson was today putting the finishing touches on his latest note to Germany concerning the sinking of the Lusitania. It already had been approved in principle by the cabinet. All that was needed today to start the communication on its way to Berlin was the making of minor changes in phraseology.

Revealing Note

The President was expected to complete the work of revision during the day. The note will then be sent to the state department for transmission by cable, probably tonight or tomorrow, to Ambassador Gerard at Berlin, who will in turn present it to the German foreign office. Previous reports that the note would be brief but emphatic are borne out, it is said, by the text as it now stands.

NO INSTRUCTIONS TO LEAVE.

Washington, June 5.—A high official of the state department said positively last night that no instructions had been given Ambassador Gerard at Berlin to warn the American colony there to be ready to leave on account of possible severance of diplomatic relations between Germany and the United States.

WATCH CASE COMPANY DECLARED NO TRUST

Federal Court Says It Does Not Violate the Sherman Law.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 4.—The United States district court here today handed down its decree in the Government's dissolution suit against the Keystone Watch Case Company.

The decree carries out the decision of the court rendered on January 2 in which it stated that the Keystone Watch Case Company was not organized in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law, but that certain practices with regard to the maintenance of prices were unlawful. The court in its decree enjoins the company from continuing these practices, and retains jurisdiction in the case for such additional relief as may hereafter seem appropriate.

RUSSIANS PRESSING RETREATING ENEMY

Flight of Germans West of Rudnik Disorderly—Heaps of Dead Poems.

PETROGRAD, June 4. Via London, June 5.—3.35 a.m. The official communication issued tonight at the headquarters of the Russian General Staff was as follows:

"In the Shvili region on June 2-3 there were skirmishes of advantage to neither side.

"On the evening of the second the enemy bombarded Ossowets with heavy guns.

"On the Narew and the left bank of the Vistula there is nothing to report.

"In Galicia, on the left bank of the San to its confluence with the Wisloka, we had a fresh success, notably at the village of Nowosielita, west of Rudnik, where our troops continued to press the enemy, who was in disorderly retreat.

"On the right bank of the San the enemy continued his attack in the valley of the River Wyzsna.

"Between Przemyśl and the Dniester in the region of Krukienka, we again repulsed the enemy, inflicting upon him heavy losses.

"Between the Rivers Bystrica and Strypa, our troops, hampering the enemy's progress, fell back on the Dniester bridgehead. During the night of June 2-3 the enemy attempted to rush our intrenchments, but our troops repulsed their assaults, who retired, abandoning heaps of dead in front of our trenches.

"In the course of our counter-attacks during the night we took 700 prisoners, including seventeen officers and captured some machine guns."

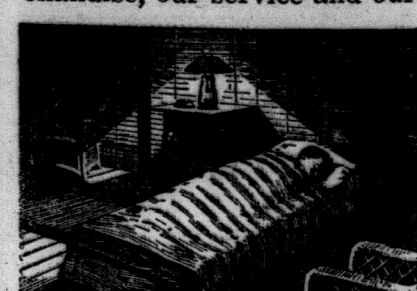
NEW GOVERNOR OF P. E. I.

JAPANESE MINISTER CHARGED WITH GRAFT

Tokio, June 5.—6:30 p.m.—The Opposition, pushing its anti-cabinet campaign, today introduced in the House of Representatives a resolution expressing lack of confidence in Viscount Kanetake Oura, minister of the interior.

The charge is made that although Viscount Oura was charged with the duty of seeing that the elections were conducted in an honest and impartial manner, he himself corruptly received a present of 1,000 yen (\$200) at the time of the March election from a candidate for membership in the House. The basis of this accusation is found in a political suit brought against Viscount Oura by the manager of the Conservative party. The matter is to be discussed next Monday.

STEAMERS DETAINED.

London, June 5.—The American tank steamer Llama, from New York for Copenhagen with a cargo of gasoline and oil, and the Norwegian steamer Einar Jarl, bound from Port Arthur, New Orleans and Norfolk for Norwegian ports with a cargo of cottonseed oil, have been taken into Kirkwall.

Rome, June 4.—Via Paris, June 5.—Fifty wild cattle materially aided Italian troops in capturing a strong Austrian position on Monte Corvo, according to the Corriere d'Italia. The Austrian garrison had surrounded itself with a high barbed wire entanglement, against which the Italians drove the cattle. Started by exploding bombs, the animals attacked the entanglements with hoofs and horns and in a quarter of an hour had swept away the obstacle so that the Italians were able to gain the summit easily. The charge of the cattle, for which no previous military experience had prepared them, is said to have stampeded the Austrians.

FIRE ENGINE DEMONSTRATION.

Embro, June 4. —A demonstration of the fire engine which may be purchased by the town was held in the park today. A small structure built of wood was set afire and the chemicals turned on the blaze. The test was declared satisfactory.
