

15 SUBDIVISIONS IN LONDON NOW OVER 300 MARK

Plans for Rearrangement Will
Be Considered at Early
Date.

EXTRA TIME TO VOTE

Mayor Little Is Asked To
Issue the Necessary
Proclamation.

Only the three members of the finance committee seeking majority honors at the next election, Aldermen Harley, Wenige and Wilson, turned out for the meeting of the finance committee on Wednesday afternoon. Chairman Watkinson and Ald. Watt are ill. Ald. Bridge could not attend and Mayor E. S. Little is out of the city. The result was that half of the business of the committee had to be laid over for another two weeks.

As civic nomination and election days each fall on days when the council should meet, it was decided to call the meetings on the following Wednesday. This will mean that two days after the new council is elected the old council will hold a meeting, the second last of the year, and thus allow the 1922 body two meetings at which to pick up the reins of the retiring councilors.

City Clerk Baker reported that fif-

teen of the electoral subdivisions of the city now exceed the number of voters as laid down by the municipal act, namely 300. This will require the creation of seven new subdivisions which will have to be arranged before the next assessment is undertaken. The matter was referred to the city clerk and the assessor to lay out. The subdivisions having more than 300 voters are 1, 3, 4, 11, 12, 13, 15, 19, 21, 30, 55, 64, 68 and 77.

Fire Alarm Conduits.
Fire Chief Altken asked that the strip of land between the sidewalk and curbs throughout the city be reserved for the fire alarm conduits, a start on the laying of which will have to be made next year, he said. The chief expressed fear that the telephone company, gasoline tanks and other works would be invading this part if he did not speak up. He also asked that parking of cars on King street near the firehall be prohibited after 6 o'clock. Recently a bylaw was put through prohibiting parking on this street at any time, but it was held up when the property owners and businessmen protested that their rights were being interfered with. The council then decided to have the building inspector report on cutting back the front of the firehall for some distance so as to give the street a clear view. The chief stated that the council the other night the firemen had to go out and move a car by hand before the apparatus was able to proceed to a fire.

Extra Time to Vote.
Ald. J. C. Wilson expressed the opinion that a proclamation should be issued by the mayor asking employers to give an extra hour for voting at the municipal election. On Tuesday, the 6th, employees are entitled to this by law. City Clerk Baker expressed fear that his staff would not be able to handle the great rush of voters if it was practically confined to the noon hour. The mayor will be asked to issue the proclamation.

The matter of remodeling a horse-drawn fire truck into a motor vehicle was held in abeyance until it is seen if there are funds enough in the fire department account to foot the bill. The fire chief said that some action was necessary, as the difficulty in covering the city by horses, on account of slippery pavements is daily becoming more acute.

Market Clerk Baker called the attention of the committee to a statement recently published that he was in trouble for insubordination. He wished to deny it. He thought it a serious reflection on his good name.

Ald. Harley suggested that he should not take the matter too seriously. Ald. Wenige stated that J. Gould, Hamilton road and Adelaide street, had objected to be "persecuted" by the tax collector who had been after him and also sent the bailiff. He was in arrears for all this year's taxes and part of the year previously. The alderman did not think that the man would leave the city, but thought he was just in bad circumstances at present, and would be all right if he got a breathing spell. The matter will be looked into.

Suburban Road Cost.
City Solicitor Meredith in a communication to the council stated that

Solicitor Elliot of the county was asking for action in regard to the city's portion of the suburban road cost. Unless there was a meeting to arrange an amicable settlement, action would be taken to collect the money. It was stated that the mayor had informally agreed to a committee to meet the county officials to go into the matter, and this will be done. The county already has a judgment against the city in the matter.

The young women of the Y. W. C. A. are anxious to garner a knowledge of municipal matters. Mrs. Henderson asked the city clerk if a meeting could be arranged for Dec. 1, which the young women might attend to hear the various municipal matters discussed. A meeting at which candidates for municipal office will speak, will be arranged for that date.

The question of the lights on Dundas street east, which have been reported as not in use for some time, was up again. Ald. Childs first introduced it. He said that street lights have been moved over into private property, and they were not lighted.

The clerk reported that two lights were moved from the street to J. M. Moore's building, and two others were installed as well. Mr. Moore was to pay for the lighting of two of them and the city the other two. The lights will have to be put into use.

The Ontario Railway Board wrote approving of the appointment of Alex. Calder to make an audit of the books of the City Gas Company.

GETS FOUR YEARS FOR JAIL ESCAPE

Chatham Prisoner Wanted in
Toronto on Similar
Charge.

CHATHAM, Nov. 16.—Four years with hard labor in Kingston Penitentiary was the sentence handed out to Basil McMeekin, alias Gordon Smith, alias John Bell, alias Harold Doyle, by Magistrate Carscadden of Wallaceburg in the county police court today.

McMeekin, who was known to the police as Gordon Smith, was arrested last June and confined to the county jail on a burglary charge, but escaped, in company with two others, and made a clean getaway. He was recaptured in Essex County about a week ago and was brought back to Chatham. He is also wanted by the Toronto police on a jail-breaking charge.

WHITE ASSAULTS MOULDS' PLEA

Declares Opponent Forgets
"Protection" Is Vital
to Labor.

ESTABLISHES "IDENTITY"

Accusing Hon. Wm. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party and the Hon. T. A. Cregar, leader of the Agrarian party of "troting along pretty close together," and holding that "the farmer and labor elements of the Ontario administration are not analogous as some people are inclined to believe," Frank White, the National Liberal and Conservative candidate in London, addressed a mass meeting of ward 3 electors in the Orange Hall, Layard street, on Wednesday evening.

E. R. Dennis supported the Tory choice and spoke briefly urging organization for his party, but predicting "blue ruin" for the Liberal forces.

Following his preliminary remarks during which he established his identity and explained that he was not a "scrap dealer" as he had been termed, Mr. White took up what has been many occasions been defined by the National Liberal and Conservative as the main issue confronting the people—the tariff question.

Claims Tariff Is Issue.
"The chief issue of this election is no doubt," said Mr. White, "the changes in the fiscal policy as advocated by two of the parties. The present policy is the same policy of 1873, modified of course from time to time. The Liberals fought this policy until they came into power in 1896 when they themselves adopted the very thing they had been fighting."

Explaining that he had scanned a list of articles and commodities that were on the proposed Liberal free list, Mr. White held that one of the articles was already "free," having been made so by the Borden administration as an essential war measure. He pointed out the "serious" local effect of this move, charging that two firms contemplated producing farm implements until the government's action when they abandoned the project as they could not compete with the United States.

Mr. White deplored the fact that as a result some \$20,000,000 was subsequently spent by Canadians who were compelled to go over the border to get their tractors.

"That's how you paid your duty," elucidated Mr. White, "in exchange of currency between the two countries. You paid New York or Washington, not Ottawa."

He pictured this sum being expended in Canada under protection.

Ridicules "Smartness."
"Yet they will say that we are smart people," continued the speaker, "but we cannot be when we allowed tractors to be imported from the United States. That's how you paid your duty."

"The Labor party has a representative in the field, and that candidate," Mr. Arthur Meighen says to the workman, "let's forget the tariff." It does not seem right to me. Canada is not entirely a farming country as he might have us imagine. We have some 700,000 industrial employees who with their dependents must number up to 2,000,000. Mr. Meighen surely has not looked up the figures and when he has said "forget the tariff," he has forgotten that one of the cardinal features of labor is protection."

ANNOUNCES CLUB GRANTED CHARTER

President of Chatham Rotarians
Expects Presentation Soon.

The presentation of the charter will be made in person by District Governor George E. Barnes of Flint, Mich., and may take place within the next two weeks. Representatives from all the Rotary Clubs in the district will be present for the ceremony, and especially from London, as that club is the sponsor for the Chatham club.

The marble for a memorial for the Sons of England of this city, who fell in the late war, is expected to arrive in the city tomorrow, and will be placed in position on Tecumseh Park within the next two weeks. The finishing work and carving of the names on the marble will be done by local cutters.

An announcement that the River road, Dover Township, is now open for traffic was made by County Engineer McGeorge this morning. Four-fifths of a mile of pavement having recently been added to the road, just west of the suburban area.

Civil service examinations for candidates are being held in the Central school here today. Six candidates will write. They have received their preliminary training in the night industrial school in this city.

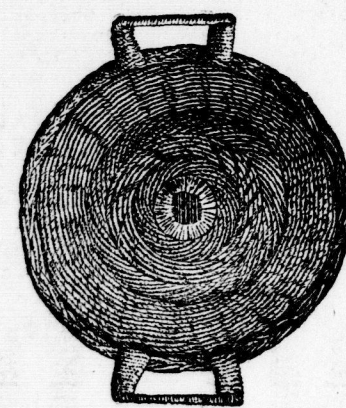
POUND REACHES NEW HIGH MARK
