The principal reason given for the decision was that any further reduction in the wages of classes under consideration would leave them without adequate means of supporting their families in a proper manner. The report also stated that after full investigation of all available statistics had been made it was believed that little or no reduction in the cost of living in Canada had occurred during the past year.

New York, Oct. 30 .- The Bank of Montreal today shipped to Canada \$1,000,000 in gold, making a total of \$17,000,000 sent to the Dominion since the beginning of October.

Canadian exchange has been at a premium in this market for several weeks, because of heavy grain purchases and a corre sponding slackening of exports to Canada.

The U. S. dollar has been quoted in Canada at a discount of from 1-8 to 3-16c. May Divert to Montreal.
