Innovation From British Columbia May Be Introduced in London Centers.

OPPOSE POPLAR PLAN

The resolution to create the committee was passed at the recent imperial economic conference in London with Canada alone officially dissenting. Some objections, however, were raised by delegates from South Africa and India, and there was some doubt if they would nominate representatives to the committee, except on a few special subjects.

The dominions were to be represented on the committee by two members, but it was understood that Canada, in view of Canadian opposition to the committee, would not nominate representatives.

An innovation in playground games may be undertaken by the utilities commission this year, following a suggestion made to General Manager E. V. Buchanan by a citizen, who has just returned from British Columbia. The idea, as carried out on the Pacific Coast, is to set aside in the center of the playground a court about eighteen feet square. This is laid out in concrete, and divided into black and white squares, similar to a checker board.
