J. H. Jones, wealthy American bootlegger, made an unsuccessful attempt to secure a court ruling involving the return to him of \$9,000 worth of confiscated liquor in police court this morning. The stuff was seized by License Inspector Bolton on July 26 and is now being held by the Ontario government dispensary.

Evidence, developing from cross-examination of witnesses, gave an intimate insight into American boot legging methods. Jones, who lives in Niagara Falls, New York state, purchased three carloads of beer from the Carling Export Malting and Brewing Company here for the purof selling it in the United

The beer was sent to Tillsonburg, and then returned to London on in-structions from Jones, who believed it would be less difficult to get it across the border at some point other than Niagara Falls. This would on the bill of lading and consigning it to fictitleus concerns in New York


