

HOME BANK SHAREHOLDERS GET FINAL WARNING American Fails In Attempt To Regain Seized Liquor

TELLS PLAN TO REMOVE LIQUOR OVER OTHER SIDE

J. H. Jones Informs Court Dry America Cause of Business.

CASE ADJOURNED

Application Made to Ontario License Board To Have Beer Returned.

J. H. Jones, wealthy American bootlegger, made an unsuccessful attempt to secure a court ruling involving the return to him of \$3,000 worth of confiscated liquor in police court this morning. The stuff was seized by License Inspector Bolton on July 26 and is now being held by the Ontario government dispensary. Evidence developed from cross-examination of witnesses, gave an intimate insight into American bootlegging methods. Jones, who lives in Niagara Falls, New York state, purchased three carloads of beer from the Carling Export Malt and Brewing Company here for the purpose of selling it in the United States.

The beer was sent to Tillsonburg, and then returned to London on instructions from Jones, who believed it would be less difficult to get it across the border at some point other than Niagara Falls. This would have been legal according to Attorney Albert Judd, but Jones and his confederates "juggled" the consignment, using a fictitious name on the bill of lading and consigning it to a fictitious concern in New York state.

Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon declined to adjourn the case for eight days, during which time J. Furlong of Windsor, Jones' attorney, will make application to the Ontario license board to have the beer returned to his client.

Tells of Methods. Jones' story was a straightforward detail of methods employed by United States liquor dealers to bring Canadian alcohol across the border and sell it to Americans. He said he met a representative of the Carling Brewery, Harry Lowe, in Niagara Falls, and arranged with him to purchase the three cars costing \$2,000. Lowe shipped the liquor to Tillsonburg, but Jones, on the suggestion of a mysterious Mr. Burke, had it sent back to London and attempted to re-ship it over the C. N. R., giving the name of a pseudo London concern as the consignee. Burke declared the stuff to be "canned beer" and sent it to the American Canning Company, a firm that does not exist.

The whole story was an involved account of how Jones expected to get the liquor across the border avoiding customs officials. His agent, Burke, had the bills of lading made out to the Webster Storage Company and the Dewane Packing Company, which are also fictitious concerns. Mr. Furlong claimed that the transaction was a legitimate one, but that Mr. Jones was the victim of "bungling" on the part of his agent. He was just unfortunate, the Windsor attorney declared.

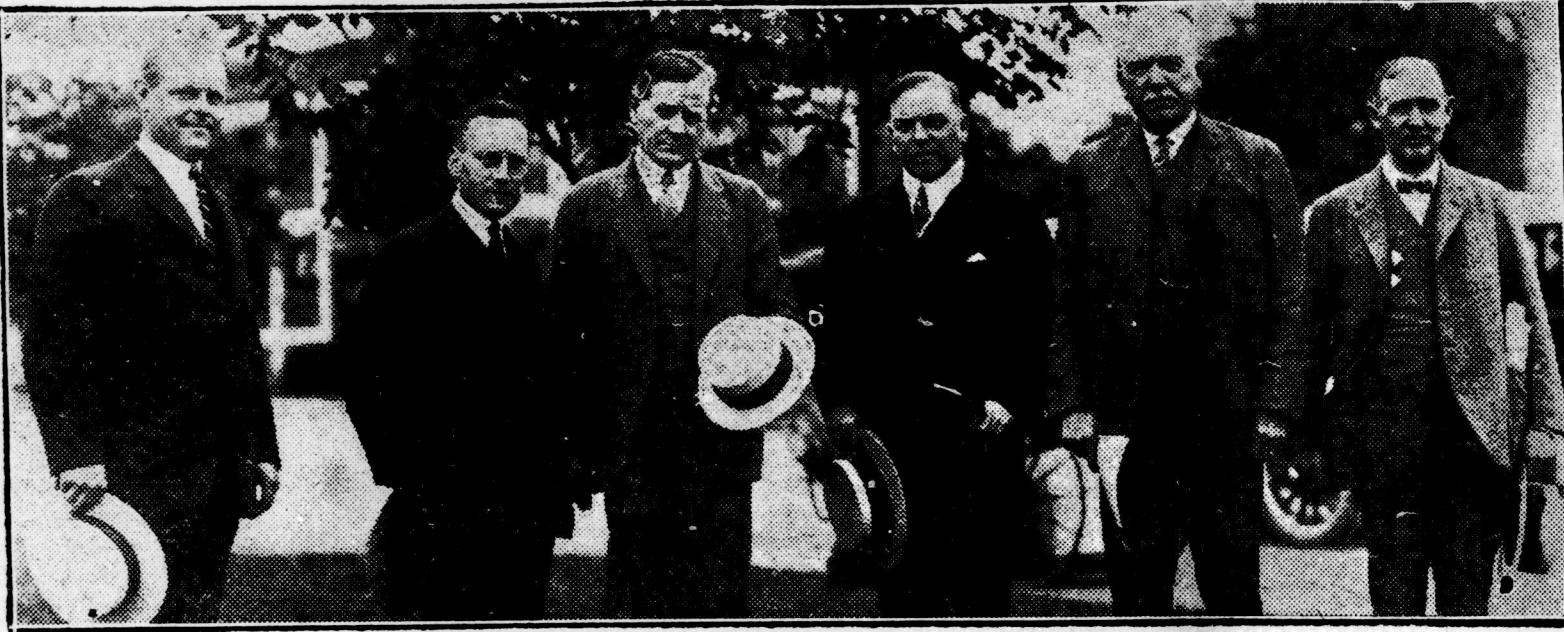

FINAL NOTICE GOES TO SHAREHOLDERS

Home Bank Liquidators Will Give Cases to Sheriff After Tomorrow.

Toronto, Aug. 19.—Tomorrow is the last day set by the liquidators of the Home Bank of Canada for shareholders who reside in Ontario to make arrangements to meet their double liability. If they fail to do so by tomorrow their accounts go into the sheriff's hands for collection, and in any case the sheriff's costs will be added to their bill. Messrs. Clarkson & Weldon, liquidators, have notified each shareholder in Ontario to this effect. The liquidators have set Aug. 25 as the date for those residents in Canada and outside of Ontario. With the letter of notification of the indebtedness of the shareholders, with the interest to date on the account, and the notification that after the date set the account will be placed in the sheriff's hands for execution. The letter is signed by the liquidators.

Kid McCoy Goes Suddenly Insane

Alienist Yesterday Pronounced ex-Pugilist Mentally Sound.

FURTHER ACCIDENTS NOW HINDER U. S. AVIATORS

ESCAPED PRISONER GOES BACK TO REFORMATORY

He was brought to the city last night and taken back to Guelph this morning.

SCIENTISTS INSPECT GLACIAL FORMATION

Cobalt, Aug. 19.—When the British Association special train stopped here a party of geologists headed by Professor A. P. Coleman, of the University of Toronto, inspected what scientists believe is the oldest glacial formation in the world. The visitors chipped off samples of conglomerate from the outcropping which is located at the Trethewey mines. The main party inspected the shafts, open cuts, mills, concentrating and refining plants of three of the largest silver mines, and saw some of the processes which make it possible to work profitably an ore which contains only seven ounces of silver per ton.

The prince will arrive in Winnipeg by special train over the C. N. R., on Sept. 16.

JURY OF OPINION MAN MURDERED

Night Watchman on Radial Line Believed Victim of Foul Play.

Canadian Press Despatch. Welland, Aug. 19.—That Newman H. Orth came to his death on or about the 13th day of June, but from the evidence submitted we are unable to say when or where he met his death, but we are of the opinion that it was at the hands of some person or persons unknown. With no further evidence submitted, the coroner's jury investigating the death of Night Watchman Orth, who disappeared from the Niagara, St. Catharines and Toronto Railway, was unable to reach a verdict last night.

Nearly two weeks later his body was found in the shallows of the Chippawa Creek near Port Robinson, fettered and weighted down with railway fishplates. In summing up the evidence at the two previous sittings of the inquest, Coroner Davis stated that the suicide theory did not appeal to him, it was not in harmony with the facts produced. He could offer no explanation to the mystery. The jury returned the verdict after deliberating one half hour.

MURDERER OF WOMAN MUST PAY WITH LIFE

Bungalow Murderer Loses Appeal Made Against Sentence.

Canadian Press Despatch. London, Aug. 19.—The appeal of Patrick Mahon to the court of criminal appeal against the sentence of death pronounced upon him for the murder of Miss Emily Kaye at Eastbourne on April 15, has been dismissed.

Mahon was convicted and sentenced to be hanged for the murder of Miss Emily Kaye, a typist, who had spent several week-ends with him at a bungalow at Eastbourne. Mahon is married. The bungalow had been rented by him for a short time. Miss Kaye's dismembered body was found in the bungalow, but her head was missing, and the police failed to locate it. Portions of Miss Kaye's body were found packed in a trunk.

NICKLE AGAIN REFUSES BAIL

Charles Matthews Must Remain in Jail For Indefinite Time.

Toronto, Aug. 19.—Charles Matthews, Jun., former deputy provincial treasurer, will remain in jail until his next appearance in police court at least, having been refused bail by Hon. W. F. Nickle, attorney-general. "A courteous but firm refusal," said J. Seymour Corley, K.C., counsel for Matthews, following his conference today with the attorney-general. "The attorney-general was very nice in the matter, but firmly refused my application for bail. My hands are tied. I cannot do anything until the matter is out of the magistrate's jurisdiction."

HIGH WIND IS BLAMED FOR CANAL DROWNING

St. Catharines, Aug. 19.—The body of Orville McGill was found in the Welland Canal below lock eight last evening near where his hat was found yesterday morning. He is believed to have tumbled from the bank during a high wind on Sunday.

MOTORIST, 85, CONFESSES DOBBIN WAS TOO SLOW

"I Will Fool Them All," E. R. Talbot Replies to Age Pessimists.

OLDEST AUTOIST

Smokes in Moderation and Is Still Youthful Enough To Dance.

E. R. Talbot, London's oldest motorist, was greeted by an Advertiser reporter in his garden early this morning. His ruddy face and cheery smile as he turned to greet the intruder caused one to envy him his happiness and health, to smile at the "three score and ten" idea. He is celebrating his 85th birthday today. When congratulated on his good health, he remarked that his friends seemed to think this will be his last anniversary. "But, I will fool them all," he said. "Mr. Talbot has received 70 cards of congratulation from his many friends in the past two days. 'And they are still coming.'"

Mr. Talbot drove a horse from his early childhood up to the mature age of 75; then, desiring more speed, and less trouble, bought a car. The same car is still in active service, and its smoothly-running engine bears witness to his mechanical skill. "I am never nervous, do my own repairing and can take the car anywhere," he replied, when asked if heavy traffic bothered him. "I have never had an accident, and never frightened anyone. But one must be careful."

He also admitted that dancing still ranks among his pleasures. "Mr. Talbot may be seen any day on the streets of London, in heavy traffic and open road, driving his car with care, the envy of many a younger motorist."

LORD GREY GIVES UP LEADERSHIP

Retires as Head of Liberal Party in House of Lords.

Associated Press Despatch. London, Aug. 19.—Viscount Grey of Falloden has retired from the Liberal leadership in the House of Lords for personal reasons.

Viscount Grey, who was secretary of state for foreign affairs in the government of Mr. Asquith when the war broke out and was British ambassador to the United States in 1919, was created a viscount in 1916. He was secretary of state for foreign affairs from 1905 to 1916. He was Liberal member of the British House of Commons from 1885 until he was elevated to the peerage in 1916. Viscount Grey is in his 63rd year.

C.N.R. FINANCES SOUND DECLARES THORNTON

Doubts If Net Profit Mark of \$30,000,000 Will Be Reached.

Winnipeg, Aug. 19.—"I do not think any one can say the result will be satisfactory, and despite a loss, there will still probably be a betterment on last year's figures," declared Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railway, when he discussed the financial position of the system during an interview here last night. Sir Henry said he regretted to say that would not reach the \$30,000,000 net profit mark he had estimated for the year, owing to a probable decrease in gross revenue, but the reduction in the operating costs would compare favorably with those of 1923.

PRINCE WILL BE LAVISHLY ENTERTAINED IN U. S. HOMES

Long Island Society Plans For Real Reception to British Heir.

MANY INVITATIONS

President Coolidge May Attend International Polo Matches.

New York, Aug. 19.—Long Island will be the scene next month of the most notable gathering of society, persons of national and international distinction, city, state and federal officials, ever brought together in this country. The occasion will be the international polo matches at Meadowbrook, beginning Sept. 6 and continuing about a week. It will be the most brilliant assembly in the history of American sports. Additional interest is displayed through the announcement from Washington of the tentative acceptance by President Coolidge of the invitation issued by Louis B. Stoddard, president of the United States Polo Association, to attend the series.

H. R. H. The Prince of Wales will add a social side to a sport which has always been made the occasion for much entertaining. Next month, however, activities will be more numerous than ever before and the prince will be sustained day and night during his stay.

It is further expected that practically the entire British embassy at Washington will attend the polo matches.

Has Many Invitations. The prince has made it emphatic that he wishes his sojourn on Long Island to be as informal as possible, and his desires are being carried out by Major Edward B. Metcalf, his official equerry, who arrived in the States several weeks ago to make arrangements for the royal visitor's entertainment.

Additional dinner parties are being arranged at all the large country homes in Long Island upon the arrival of His Royal Highness. After the Piping Rock Club stag dinner, will be banquets at the homes of Harry Payne Whitney, Devereux Milburn, Henry Rogers Whitney, John S. Phipps, Edwin D. Morgan, Charles Steele and Louis E. Stoddard.

After the Piping Rock dinner, on the final course of the last dinner of the extensive program has been fasted, the royal visitor will be taken to New London, Conn., on a warship, where he will entrain for Calgary direct.

For several days last month, Lord Southborough of London, former civil lord of the British Admiralty, was in Connecticut arranging facilities for the trip west. According to present plans, New London will see little of Britain's idol. A special Canadian National train will be waiting on the million-dollar pier, and the royal guest will step from the ship directly to his private car.

STEFANSSON IS NOW RETURNING TO CANADA
