

LABRADOR COMES INTO PROMINENCE

Local Grenfell Mission Hears of Visit of World Aviators and Explorer.

HOLDS BOOK SHOWER

A goodly selection of books for the Grenfell mission were collected at the First Presbyterian church this week when that organization held a tea and book shower there. Mrs. Arthur Little, president of the local branch of the Grenfell mission, received the many guests who came to buy tea and offer gifts of books. During the course of the afternoon the following communication from the mission field in Labrador was read, explaining the growing importance of Labrador.

"Britain's oldest colony, Labrador, has been much in the limelight during the past year," says the letter. "At one time that country was thought to be of little value, but people are now waking up to the fact that it has a future. Dr. Harry L. Paddon, in charge of the Grenfell hospital at Indian Harbor, says that that country is not the chronic invalid some would have us believe, but merely needs to be lifted over the period between chaos and cosmos when it will find itself and become an integral part of the British Empire, and a credit to those who have faith in its people."

Dispute Boundary. "Already a commission of eminent men from Great Britain, Canada and Newfoundland, is considering a settlement of the boundary dispute between the Canadian and Newfoundland Labrador. Whatever apportionment may be made, of this we can rest assured, no part of it will go outside the empire. Time was when no one cared where the boundary lay, but the fact that two countries are now is a significant sign."

MacMillan Arrives.

"Not long after the world flares came and went, Indian Harbor got another thrill when MacMillan and party came ashore, accepted entertainment at the hands of the Grenfell staff, and then took them on board and exhibited the many interesting curios brought from the far north. Who, then, will dare say Labrador is not on the map?"
