





Belleville, Ont., Dec. 20.-Bernard Brown, aged 9 years, and Eugene Ellsworth, aged 10 years, were drowned here late this afternoon while playing on the ice at the mouth of the harbor. Lloyd Ellsworth, the 8-year-old brother of Eugene, saw the boys disappear through the thin ice and gave the alarm, but the bodies have not yet been recovered.
