TOWN COUNCIL COMPLETES ITS WORK FOR THE YEAR

Schiedel to be Manager of Water and Light Department. Fire Chief Karges Explains Runaway

The last regular meeting of the Town Council for this year was held last evening. It was marked by unusual features. After the transaction of business the Mayor and other members of the Council enjoyed a free discussion of the proceedings in Council during the past year, and of the prospects for the coming year.

The following report of the Finance Committee regarding the assessment on taxation was received and adopted.

Your committee on Finance and Printing met this evening to consider certain claims for rebates of taxes upon farm lands within the Corporation. After fully considering the assessments upon the lands in question, the situation of the lands, and all circumstances, your Committee recommends the following rebates:

Your committee also considered the application of Mrs. Bailey for a rebate of part of her taxes, and it appearing that there had been some misunderstanding on her part in connection with her assessment, your Committee recommends that a rebate or allowance of \$16.17 upon her taxes for 1913 be made.

Your Committee further recommends that a refund amounting to \$55.00 be paid to John Schindelmeyer for taxes for the year 1912 and 1913.

That Runaway.

Fire Chief Karges was present and explained the circumstances of the runaway by the fire-train on Sunday evening. He stated that the engine at the time when the alarm was sent in had only three men at the controls, but it was necessary that another man be provided for duty on the truck and ladder wagon at that hour.

Mayor Fischer pointed out that another man should have been secured before now and remarked that the runaway might have cost a disastrous loss had it occurred one minute sooner when a street car filled with people was going down King street. He censured the Fire Department and Committee for not providing an additional man at that hour.

Chairman Kutt of the Fire Committee in reply stated that Mr. C. Peterson,

the owner of the train, would not agree to pay the costs of providing an additional man and that the town could not expect him to do so.

The Mayor: "He either must provide the man or different arrangements must be made."

Councillor Roos expressed of Chief Karges about the speed at which the train ran at the street corners. The chief in reply stated that the turnings were not made at too great speed and that Mr. Simpson was a most careful and efficient driver.

Bylaws passed.

The following bylaws were given the third reading, and finally passed:

- (1) Providing for the holding of the annual municipal elections, including polls, clerks and deputy returning officers.
- (2) Sewer and under drain on Fischer street from Allan street to John street.
- (3) Grading on Esplanade from John street to Allan street.
- (4) Sidewalk on street from Esplanade to Fischer street.
- (5) Terrace pavement on Fischer street from Allan street to John street with cement curb and gutter.

DEPUTY-REEVE SCHIEDEL IS THE NEW MANAGER

Water, Light and Gas Commission Appoints Successor to Mr. F. S. Kumpf. New Manager Will Commence Duties on Jan. 15th

Deputy-Reeve Schiedel is the new manager of the Water, Light and Gas Department. The appointment was made at the meeting of the Commission last evening and was unanimous. Mr. Schiedel's name being the only one brought before the Commission. Mr. Schiedel will commence his duties on January 15th. The salary is \$1800 per annum.

Mr. Schiedel has had a long and practical business training, which will prove valuable in the discharge of his duties. During his thirty-one years' residence in Waterloo he has been stationed in the office of the William Schider Mills. During the thirteen years previous to the installation of hydro-power when there was a special electric lighting at the mill, he gained valuable knowledge of the electrical part of the business. His municipal experience will also be a help to him. During the years 1899, 1900 and 1901 he was a member of the Town Council for two years, 1901 to 1902 he was on the Public School Board, of which he was chairman for one year; for the past two years he has been the deputy-reeve and chairman of the Finance Committee. His services during the past two years have been greatly appreciated by the mayor and fellow members of the Town Council, who at the meeting of that body last evening expressed regret at Mr. Schiedel's leaving from the Council but congratulated him and the Commission for their success in securing Mr. Schiedel's services.

Mr. Schiedel is a member of the Council when the Water works plant was built and took over by the town.

COUNCILLOR KUTT WILL BE A CANDIDATE

WILL ENDEAVOR TO PROVIDE THE MONEY

Town Council Discusses Quality Mattress Co. By-Law

The matter of the Quality Mattress Company, Ltd., which was discussed by the Town Council at the meeting last evening. Messrs. Deatzer and Montag of the company were present and explained as to what the town could do regarding the loan. Mr. Deatzer stated that had they known that there might be no objection to the by-law from other quarters than Berlin they would not have had the by-law submitted to the people. They did not think that prospective purchasers of the debentures would refuse the debentures of account of this technicality.

Mayor Fischer in reviewing the situation said: "I do not know what to do. Regarding the proposal to secure special legislation to have the by-law validated I must say that I believe that there are too many reasons why the legislature would not grant the request. This law was passed several years ago for the purpose of preventing our municipality from outbidding another in securing industries already established. I think that the best way would be for you to get private buyers of the debentures."

Mr. Dratzer in reply, stated that he thought it was Waterloo's duty to find the buyer.

Mayor Fischer: "But you can not blame us for this situation."

Councillor Roos assured Messrs. Deatzer and Montag that the town did not wish to break faith, but would assist them in finding a means of overcoming the difficulty.

Councillor Bricker gave a valuable suggestion. He thought that the matter should be brought before the Board of Trade and that about twenty citizens could be found who would agree to give a loan of \$400 or \$500 each. "I myself would be willing to do so, and I believe, Mr. Mayor, that you would also do likewise," he said.

Mayor Fischer: "I will certainly do all I can to provide the necessary money." Councillor Roos expressed the same opinion.

Councillor Bricker also thought that a loan of \$5000 could be secured and a second mortgage given for the remaining \$5000. The mayor concurred in this opinion. The question was brought to an encouraging close with the remark by Councillor Roos: "Bring the matter before the Board of Trade. I think we can bring the question to a successful conclusion. At least we will try our very best."

GOOD YEAR FOR ELECTRIC DEPARTMENT

At the regular meeting of the Water and Light Commission held last evening the manager's report on the Electric Department for the year was received and adopted. The profit for the year is \$3105.71 after allowing \$3500 for depreciation. This will ensure another reduction in the rates next year. During the year 103 new consumers were added. More station transformer capacity and with it the necessary switch board panels and switching apparatus will be required. The cost of these changes will be about \$5350. The changes in the whole department will amount to \$10,000, for which debentures will have to be issued unless the profits for the year will be anticipated.

In the absence of the chairman Dr. W. L. Hilliard was authorized to sign all checks of the Department. The sum of \$500 was granted to the retiring manager, Mr. Ford S. Kumpf, for extra services.
