SHORT MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

F. A. O'Leary Appointed Collector of Rates and Taxes—New Boxes Ordered.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Firemen's Hall Monday evening. His Worship Mayor McKay presiding. There were present Councillors, Wallace, Patterson, Moores, Bissett, Chamberlain, St. Onge, and Duncan.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

A communication was read from the Compensation Board calling the council's attention to a balance due them on last year's insurance of \$233, and giving an estimate of \$302 for this year. Communication referred to the Finance Committee with power to act.

The usual departmental reports were then gone into and ordered paid.

The Assessment and Appeals Committee reported recommending that a reduction of \$200 be made in the valuation of Joseph Belanger's assessment, that Mrs. Guimond's taxes be \$50, that Thos. Roberts be relieved from his poll tax, that the taxes of John P. LaTourneau be written off, and that no reduction be made in W. A. Smith's, Wm. Brown's or Howard Sanson's taxes. Report received and adopted.

The Finance Committee submitted Auditor Adam's report on the accounts as closed Dec. 31st last. On motion the town clerk was authorized to arrange for the printing of the blue book.

Coun. Bissett suggested that the tax roll be printed in the Blue Book instead of receipts from Light and Water. No action taken.

On motion of Coun. Duncan, Mr. Fred A. O'Leary was appointed collector of rates, water and light rates also reader of electric meters under the jurisdiction of the town treasurer at a salary of \$125.00 per month.

Coun. Patterson was not in favor of this appointment. The council had all the machinery necessary to collect such rates and did not think a high salaried official was necessary.

Was another case of spending the ratepayers' money without good cause. Coun. Bissett was of the same opinion.

Councillor Wallace said that at that stage of the discussion he would not say that he favored the appointment. He felt that perhaps such a collector would relieve the manager of the Electric Light department, a six dollar a day man from such duties, and also O'Leary might be able to help in line work, etc. The move might be a good one.

Coun. Moores said that the collection of rates and taxes was the main thing. If a new man could do the work thoroughly he favored his appointment temporarily.

Coun. Belle-Ile favored a radical change. The council had all the machinery. Coun. Patterson spoke of for many years, but what good was it if it was out of order and wouldn't work.

Coun. Duncan spoke strongly in favor of the new system. He pointed out that if the new man was placed collecting on a five per cent. basis he would get between \$17.00 and \$20.00 for the default taxes and rates alone. He wanted every dollar collected and the overdraft reduced.

His Worship said that what they wanted was efficiency. It appeared that the police would not attend to tax collections. He said the notices published re taxes was having a good effect. Twelve thousand dollars had come in and four thousand dollars more had been arranged. He felt sure that if our present officials got down to business better results would follow.

Coun. Wallace said that after hearing the discussion he felt like giving the proposed system a trial. If it was not satisfactory after a month or two we could make a change.

The motion carried, Couns. Duncan, Belle-Ile, St. Onge, Wallace, Moores, and Chamberlain voting for and Patterson and Bissett against.

WORLD RECORD FOR LOAD OF LOGS

Hauled at Ben. Underhill's Camp on Upsalquitch River.

The largest load of logs ever hauled by two horses, so far as is known was that at B. F. Underhill's camp on the Upsalquitch river, who hauled for the Shives Lumber Co.

On March 10th preparations were made for the breaking of the record in large loads. The large bob-sleds to which were harnessed Cap and Frank, one of the finest teams of the Shives Lumber Company with driver James Clark, handling the lines were placed and then the expert loaders, John Hyland of South Esk, Miramichi, Patrick and Edward Casey of Barnaby River and Fred Smith of Underhill, camp foreman set to work.

The load was piled up until there were 350 logs on the bobs scaling 16,349 feet, and hauled to the landing. The counting and scaling were done by the president of the league, J. D. Black, of Fredericton, who resigned at the time as a result of the Chatham club's action.

CHATHAM LOSES BOTH PROTESTS

Meeting at Bathurst Last Friday Decides in Favor of Campbellton.

Bathurst, N. B., March 2.—(Star Special.)—The New Brunswick Hockey League at its annual meeting here today, the first meeting under a new constitution framed after that of the Ontario Hockey Association, upheld the protest of the Campbellton Club regarding the game played at Campbellton on February 9 last, when the Chatham Club, disregarding the appointment by the then president of the league, Sandy Staples, of Fredericton, as the sole referee for the game, held up the game until almost 10 a.m. by refusing to go on the ice, except with Frank Brown, of Moncton, also acting as referee.

The league also decided that the Chestnut Trophy be awarded for 1921, as a penalty for the Chatham club's failing to follow the instructions of the president of the league, J. D. Black, of Fredericton, who resigned at the time as a result of the Chatham club's action.
