SHIFTING SANDS. Vessel—Escape of Nearly all on Board. HALIFAX, N. S., July 10 .- The govern ment steamer Newfield, from Sable Island, brought up Captain Jacobson, his wife and brought up Captain Jacobson, his wife and child, and a nurse, and sixteen of the crew of the Norwegian barque Yorkshire. The Yorkshire was from Barbadoes, fifteen days out, bound to Montreal with a full cargo of sugar. On the night of July 4, the light on the east point of Sable Island was made, and the vessel was kept well off. Suddenly the ship struck at a point sixteen miles off the light, where, as the captain was afterwards informed, no other vessel had ever been wrecked. The sands of the island had evidently so shifted as to throw up banks where formerly there was safe navigation. The sea was not rough. Two boats were launched and ordered to remain by the ship in case it became necessary to leave her suddenly. The boats, besides being manned, were attached to the ship by lines. It may have gone off to sea and been picked up by some passing vessel, but Capt. Jacobson fears it was capsized.
