

The Government, represented by the Admir-aliy, has made a special arrangement with the White Star Company, by which the service of their fleet is secured to the nation at peace prices in the event of transports being required, and the same agreement provides for the con-struction of new vessels by that Company of a type to meet naval-requirements asarmed cruis-

struction of new vessels of that company of a type to meet naval-requirements asarmed cruis-ers. For these vessels—which are to be the largest and fastest vessels afloat—an annual subvention is to be haid, in consideration of the owners building them to meet the Admir-alty designs. When war breaks out, as every-body knows, the charge for freights goes up against a government with great and painful swiftness. It is hotter on all accounts to make arrangements in time of peace, and to have purchased the right of fair treatment from the companies by assisting them beforehand to ren-der their ships serviceable. Concurrently with the mail contracts the Admiralty has signed and seeled a treaty with the White Star Com-pany, whereby the terms are settled upon which the nation can obtain in times of war the services of this splendid fleet. The same document providesfor the construction of a new type of White Star steamers. designed to meet all neval requirements as armed cruisers. It is not easy to imagine vessels more splendid than those which already, like the Adriatic and the Britannic, run under the White Star flag. For use in war there are, nevertheless, certain changes which must be made. The engines must be seated as low as possible, and protect-ed by the coal-bunkers and other means; the ship must be divided into many water-tight compartments, so as to lessen the chance of her foundering when penetrated by a shot; and the decks must be strengthemed in order to support the traversing of cannon. Speed however is the very essen-tial point for these armed cruisers, and as they prover, there is no fear that an enormy will out-strip them aslong as they carry any coalin their bunkers.
