Alfred E. Lindsay Confesses He Swindled Many.

SUICIDE CONSIDERED

Accepts All Blame For Alleged Stock Transactions.

NEW YORK, Feb. 28 .- Alfred E. Lindsay, accused of swindling society women out of nearly \$1,000,000 in fake stock deals, to-day confessed that many of the charges against him were true, according to Richard C. Murphy, assistant district attorney. Lindsay, a former stock broker and strike-breaker, was arrested last night at Overbrook, Pa., following an indictment charging grand arceny, and brought to New York this morning by detectives.

Lindsay accepted all blame for the alleged transactions, Mr. Murphy said, and declared that when he was exposed in the newspapers he and his wife discussed the possibilities of a double suicide. He broke down and sobbed while dictating his alleged confession to a stenographer in the presence of detectives and others in the district attorney's office, according to Murphy.

Mr. Murphy said he frankly admitted aking money from Mrs. W. H. Arnold and Mrs. Dorothy Atwood, which he
