Several months later he was discharged from the asylum on certificate of the superintendent that he was sane, and his first trial was begun on June 20, 1923. A second trial was necessitated by a disa-greement of the jury, and this was begun February 25, 1924. The result of the second trial was the same as that of the preceding one, and Delorme was called upon to submit to a third, which opened October 6 before Mr. Justice Tessier. Until the last two days there was

little public interest in the third trial.
