DOMINION OF CANADA.
ORDER IN COUNCIL.
GOVERNMENT HOUSE, OTTAWA,
Monday, the 9th Day of
September, 1884.
PRESENT:
HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN
COUNCIL.

WHEREAS, the disease of pleuro-pneumonia among cattle in the Northwest, since its first appearance in 1872, has been the cause of great loss of property and has been the cause of the depopulation of several large sections of the Northwest; and whereas, it is the duty of the Government to see that the public interest is protected in such matters; and whereas, the Department of Agriculture has the honor to advise that it is deemed expedient to order that the following regulations be observed in relation to the said disease:—

1. All persons who are in possession of cattle or horses, or who are in possession of any other animal, shall be bound to keep such animals in a clean and healthy condition, and to take all necessary precautions to prevent the same from becoming diseased.
2. Any person who is aware that any of his cattle or horses, or any other animal, is affected with the disease of pleuro-pneumonia, shall immediately report the same to the nearest Government Veterinary Surgeon, or to the nearest Medical Officer of Health, and shall take all necessary precautions to prevent the disease from spreading to other animals.
3. Any person who is found to be in possession of any animal affected with the disease of pleuro-pneumonia, shall be liable to a fine of not more than five dollars, and to the forfeiture of such animal.
4. Any person who is found to be in possession of any animal which has been affected with the disease of pleuro-pneumonia, shall be liable to a fine of not more than five dollars, and to the forfeiture of such animal.

We believe that there are several aspirants
for election to the Northwest
Council from this district. This seems to
us rather premature as yet. The first and
most natural step to take would be to dis-
cover whether this district has the requisite
population or not. There must be 1,000
people, not counting aliens or Indians, in an
area of 1,000 square miles, and it is by no
means certain that this district can show
that many. We feel quite as strongly of
the question as any one, but think the
matter should be gone about in a systematic
manner. Those who are thinking of offer-
ing themselves to the people for election
would have much time and trouble by set-
ting themselves to discover whether, accord-
ing to the present law, this district is en-
titled to be made an electoral district or
not, and if not, to try and get the law mod-
ified in such a way as to accomplish the
end. All this takes considerable time and
no insignificant amount of hard work. Those
who wish to run for election because they
have the best interests of the country at
heart, and not because a certain amount of
honor and credit may be connected with it,
N. W. C., will look at it in this light. It is
obviously foolish to talk about going to the
Council until it is ascertained whether or not
the district can send an elected member.
When the time for such election does come
meetings will be held and nominations be in
order. The most important and leading in-
terests of the country is stock, and the
furthering of that industry should be the
aim and policy of a member from here. At
the same time, other important matters must
be combined with that, which not inter-
fering with it in any way, look to the gen-
eral well being of the country. The people
want a good man when they do send one,
and who is not afraid to speak his mind,
and who cannot be influenced by the
flattery and cajoling of those whom many
people consider it an honor to be intimate
with, or to be taken notice of by them.
When the time comes the Gazette will give
its undivided support to the man, who in
