Treaty between the United Kingdom and the Latvian Republic for the **Extradition of Fugitive Criminals**

Signed at Riga, July 16, 1924

[Ratifications exchanged at Riga, July 7, 1925]

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India; and the President of the Latvian Republic, having determined, by common consent, is conclude a treaty for the extradition of criminals, have accordingly named their plenipotentiaries:

Who, after having exhibited to each other their respective full powers, and them in good and due form because other their respective full powers, found them in good and due form, have agreed upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 1

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other, und certain circumstances and conditions stated in the present treaty, those person who, being accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences enumerated Article 2, committed within the jurisdiction of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party.

ARTICLE 2

Extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following crimes offences:-

- 1. Murder (including assassination, parricide, infanticide, poisoning), attempt or conspiracy to murder attempt or conspiracy to murder.
- 3. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of women.
- 5. Carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have carnal knowledge, of a generative structure of a generative structure of a generative structure of a generative structure structure
- 6. Indecent assault.
- 8. Child stealing, including abandoning, exposing or unlawfully detaining
 9. Abduction.
- 10. Procuration.
- 11. Bigamy.
- 12. Maliciously wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm.
- Threats, by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort money or otherwise.

- 15. Perjury, or subornation of perjury.
