Inquiries of the Ministry

Hon. Jean-Luc Pepin (Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): Mr. Speaker, this subject will be submitted to the municipal council by the executive committee of the city of Montreal, on Friday. It will then be decided whether or not the city of Montreal agrees to our proposals. In so far as the province of Quebec is concerned, I was in touch, a few minutes ago, with Mr. Beaudry who is the Minister of Industry and Commerce for the province of Quebec. He informed me that his government is still considering the proposals I made Tuesday evening and Wednesday morning.

Hon. Martial Asselin (Charlevoix): Mr. Speaker, I have a supplementary question.

In connection with the proposals made to the Quebec government, is that government not bound to guarantee the deficit of Expo, for 1969, before it is in a position to operate Man and his World?

Mr. Pepin: Mr. Speaker, the Prime Minister has indicated clearly yesterday that our proposals covered two points. First, there is the Dozois proposal which is well known. Secondly, there is the matter of an agreement by the city of Montreal to settle its share of the Expo deficit. All these points must be agreed to by the three governments concerned.

Mr. Bernard Dumont (Frontenac): Mr. Speaker, I have a supplementary question.

Has the Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce considered granting an interest free loan in order to guarantee to the province the financing of Man and his World?

Mr. Pepin: No, far from it, Mr. Speaker. The federal government will in fact pay the interest.

INCREASE IN WOOD PRODUCTS PRICES
