I have given as full an explanation as I can, not only today but in the past, about why it would be unwise to confine ourselves to the legal processes as a means of getting redress for these situations in the United States. We must use the whole array of instruments available to us. Those include direct government representation, public information programs, and assisting groups who do intervene in the legal processes. But it would be unwise, impractical, and counter to our interests if we were to intervene directly in the American court process ourselves.

GRANT SOUGHT BY EDMONTON PLANT

Mr. Douglas Roche (Edmonton South): Madam Speaker, my question is directed to the Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce, to whom I gave notice. My question concerns the possible loss of 600 jobs in Edmonton in the textile industry. Will the Minister support an application by GWG of Edmonton to the Canadian Industrial Renewal Board for a \$200,000 grant that will enable a \$700,000 modernization program to take place, undertaken by GWG? That would save 600 jobs in the hard hit textile industry at a time when the unemployment rate in Edmonton is at a very high 13 per cent.
