HYDRO EMPLOYEES ACCEPT AWARD OF BOARD

Report of Conciliators Read at Meeting Recommends Wage Increases and Better Conditions for Electrical Workers—Employers' Representative Disagrees With Colleagues.

Employees of the Toronto Hydro Commission who are organized in the Electrical Workers' Union...

Fred B. Pezz, organizer of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers...

Amongst the recommendations of the board are increases in wages ranging from 1 per cent. to 50 per cent...

Trouble struck drivers who formerly were working 24 hours per week at 21 cents per hour...

Clause 25 states that "Frank W. Wegman, the representative of the employers on the board, does not agree with the other members of the board..."

The board also recommends that the schedule be adopted by the commission and the men remain in force until May, 1915...

The following tables show the old schedule and the recommendations of the board:

Foremen, linemen, old scale, \$99.25 per month; new scale, \$105 per month; trouble department, \$105 per month; new scale, \$110 per month...

Patrolmen and repairmen who are receiving 33 1/2 cents per hour are placed on a monthly basis with a straight wage of \$53...

Disguised as a workman, Malatesta made his way to the Swiss frontier, crossing the boundary at Chiasso. He remained in concealment for a time, and is now believed to be on his way to London.

EMPERESS RUDDER WAS ENLARGED SAID EXPERT

Foot Added to Improve Steering After Accident Six Years Ago—Hole in Liner's Side Measures Over Three Hundred Square Feet in Area.

QUEBEC, June 24.—The explanation of all the suggestions that have been made during the enquiry into the wreck of the Empress of Ireland about the vessel's steering gear came out this afternoon at the enquiry of the Dominion Commission, when Percy Hillhouse of the Fairfield Shipbuilding Co., which constructed her, explained how, after an accident to it in 1908, one foot was added to the Empress' rudder area to improve her steering qualities.

BAR OUT HINDUS DURING LEGAL STRUGGLE

Rumor That Shipload Would Be Allowed to Land at Vancouver Not Credited at Ottawa—Both Sides Agree to Hasten Court Decision.

By a Staff Reporter. OTTAWA, June 24.—A story gained currency today to the effect that the Canadian Government would defer to the wishes of the British Government regarding the Hindus, and admit to British Columbia the 350 East Indians on board the Komagatu Maru...

One official said that the feeling against the Hindus was so strong in Vancouver that if the government gave orders to allow the Hindus to land, serious rioting would follow.

The statement made by the government a few days ago was that the Hindus would not be allowed to land in Canada and nothing has transpired since which would lead to the view that there would be any relaxation of the order barring them out.

To Make Test Case

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 24.—Apparently the government intends to have the legal end of the Hindu controversy fully threshed out in the courts. This morning there was another formal announcement in connection of an adjournment of the mandamus proceedings brought by counsel for the Hindus to compel the immigration officials to give decisions on examination of immigrants in order that these decisions might then be in line for appeal to the courts.

REPORT ON CANAL WIDE IN SCOPE

Some thirty thousand freight manifests have been examined and much other information is now being got together.

SEVEN KILLED IN BIG STORM

Scores Injured, Crops Damaged, Buildings Torn Down in Minnesota and Wisconsin.

CANADIAN PRESS DESPATCH. CHICAGO, June 24.—Seven deaths, scores of injured, crop damage amounting to thousands of dollars and heavy damage to buildings were caused in an electrical and wind storm that swept Minnesota and Wisconsin from the northwest today.

Communication between many cities was cut off owing to the prostration of telegraph and telephone wires. It was feared tonight that a still larger loss of life would be revealed when the full extent of the storm is known.

IN MINNESOTA MISS LORETTA GRAM, Margaret Kelly, and Louis Grams were drowned when the wind overturned their canoe. Esther Munson was killed when her home collapsed. Two deaths were reported at Wausau, Wis., when a barn in which a country wedding was being celebrated was demolished. Another death was reported from Clear Lake, Wis.
