## SHIPPING MATTERS.

The steel ship Scotish Lochs, now at looston, has leeen fixed to load deals at St. John, N. I3, for Liverpool or 13arry at 33: 9d.

The steamer Longhurst, after discharging a cargo of sugar at Montreal, will proceed to Quebec and load lumber for MieArthur Bros. Co., I.td.
The steam barque Orion, of Kingston, is landing square timber at Thombury, Ont., for Quebec. The timber is being loatied from rafts.
The British ship Aleander, with lumber from Vancuaver, B. C., is repurted io have arrived at Calais, France, and the Hawaiian schooner, Queen Cits, from the same place for Kube, Japan, has also reached its destimation
The season on the catalat Allanny, N. $i_{\text {i., upens }}$ with unusually low nite of freights prevailing. The opening sate for lumber used to be $\$ 1.75$, then it got down to $\$ 1 . j 0$ and now it iv $\$ 1.35$. Competition with the milroads lias had much to do with this decliac.
The American schooner Comet has been chaterec: to load lumber at the Roval City Mills, New Westminster, 13. C., and is now on the way to that port from San Prancisco. Among other vessels chatered to load at llritish Columbin are the l'urtan, to load at Moods: ville, for shanghas; the Amerscan barque Areturus, to load for Sania Kosalia; the barkenturie Wrestler, now being fitted out at l'ort Angeles, to luad lumier at the lirunette batw Mills, for Shanghai, Chana. The folluning vasels are loading lumber at lancuuscr. Chillian barh, lakic Lemane, fur Valparaisu, British ship, Earl of Ilopetown, for Adelaide, N. S. W.: Inecrican schononer Voluntect, fur Shanghai : Ilritish ship, Blairgowrie, for South Afriea.

## CURTIENT TRADE CONDITLONS.

 ontakio.SHIPMENTS of lumber from the mulls of the l'ovince ale increasins, but not to the extent that is expected at this season of the year, and especialls in view of the dullness that prevailed during the months of Itarch and Apial. l.ocal trade, in different points of Ontario, though not of preat volume, would secm to be more active, relatively, than is trade with the United States. Compared with other jears, the number of buyers from across the border is small, and thansactions are of a restricted nature. As the months go on, it is loped that more activity will show itself in this direction. Around the mills there is aloyndance of life, cutting proceeding with energy, Summarized in a sentence, it nay be satd that a steady lumber business is being done, and the month's record will show a considerable volame of sales, possibly better than some are anticipating, though the general fecling is, that the season's trade is dragging. Prices are holding firm, unless companisons are made with two years ago, and as between these years, prices of lumber to-day show a decline.
quabec and new hrunswick.
The shipping, of lumber in Quebec has commenced for the season, and kives sometting of the old-time life to trade in that prosince. Exporters to the Cnited Kingdon, whh whom we have talked, an tucipate a farr season's business. Not a little of the lumber that will go from Queber, will be brought to that point from Dichig:an, Sharpless Bros., McArthur Bros. Co., Ltti, and others operating in this manner. Within the week, the lumber situatoon in New Brunswick has not changed to any matetial extent, except that the amount of lumber shipped is on the increase, mills are acuvely cutting, and there is a good deal of movement with all those working on the drises. Elsewhere we have noted the condition of the drives at many important points. The spruce market cuntinues to engase athen ton with Nell Brunswick lumbermen. Ia the C'nited States, the strength that was piven to spruce carly in the season by the organization of the Northeastern Lumbermen's Assubiation, does not wathe, and New Brunswick lumbermen are hoping to secure advantage from this suffeming of prices, and the alle-ed shortage of supplies at different point. It must be admitted, at the same time, that one needs to weyh carefully the different statements that are given out resarding the conditions of the spruce market in the Unted States. There ate shrewd lumbermen on both sides of the border, who question if
all the good things that are predicted of spruce will materialize.

Trade in the month of May, so far, shows quite an adrance in British Columbia over that of the preceding month. Good sized shipments are being sent into the Northwest and Ontaio. The Pacific Coast Lumber Co., of New Westuninster, is reported to be shipping per C. I'. R. from four to six car loads per wetk into the localates named. Shpments to the C'nited States are numerous and of nood size. A slance at the shipping recotls tell of an increase in exports to Japan. South Afric.t, China, and the United Kingdom. The larger opening of Chin.a ports for business, is almost cerrain io help the trade in lumber, from British Columbia; already considerable pine and fir from that district is going there. With the appointment of Mr. Forbes Vernon, as Agent-General for British Columbia in Great Pritain, and the recent visit to England of the Premier, Mr. Turner, it is anticipated that an increased demand will be creared for British Columbia lumber.

## united states.

The weather has been fine enough in Mav to give an impetus to business, and this condition, combined with favorable reports recenved of the prowng crops, has helped to impart new life to even hardheaded lumbermen. Mercurnal in a measure, some portions of the trade have been disposed to grow quite satngune as to the future of the next few months, and ell us that we are now on the eve of a big season'strade. Everybody hodes that this brightening up of business will prove reat. It cannot be said, however, that the stze of orders reccived, nor the frequency with which they reach lumber offices, is swelling busmess to very remarkable proportions, though it must be admitted that things are improwins. Recent sales of northern pine are reported from Wuluth, and taken as evidence of improvement. One lumber journal, that is usually conscrialice in its prognostications, has gone so fat is to sas that "such premommons indicate that extreme lassitude and indifference is p.issing, and that soon we are likely to winess the most remarkable scrambie tor white pine stocks that we have seen since the early cigh:ics. Everyone concerned will say, "may thus speedily be the case," fot the wish is father to the thought with all. The mills at all poims are full wothe season's business, and seem to be laying themselves out for a good sized cat. With navigatuon opened, there is a sur in this direction, a factor that helps trade even in the dullest times.
