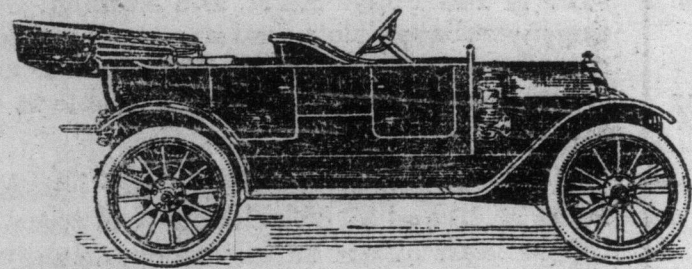

CANON DOUGLAS WANTS COMMANDMENTS REVISED

Would Restore "What Scholars
Are Agreed Was the Original
and Shorter Form."

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 28.—"Revise the Ten Commandments," urged Rev. Dr. Geo. A. Douglas, canon of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, New York, in speaking at the 25th congress of the Protestant Episcopal Church on "the need for prayer book revision to meet present day conditions."

"Let us have the courage," he said, "to restore our prayer book version of the Ten Commandments to what scholars are pretty generally agreed was the original and shorter form."

He said that with prayer book revision in line with the movement for church unity, the Roman, Greek and

Anglican churches ultimately must be able to come together in public worship. "In revision," he suggested, "we must not snap the links that bind us to these ancient churches."

He regarded the present book of common prayer as unsuitable for "working people and so-called socialists" who have been attracted to the Christian churches. The revised prayer book should give ministers the right on occasion to "pray ex tempore, without resorting to the either rampant or radical."

G.N.W. IS CONTROLLED BY WESTERN UNION

United States Company tried to
Eliminate Competition by Har-
ing Ally in Canada.

On the resumption of the general enquiry into telegraph tolls by the railway commission yesterday morning, Fred Koper, secretary-treasurer of the Dominion Telegraph Co., told the story of the absorption of the Vancouver telegraph system by the Western Union in 1878, and the subsequent alliance with the G. N. W. to control Canadian business. He told how the G. N. W. had leased the Dominion Telegraph Company's lines for 99 years. The late J. J. Gould owned \$200,000 stock in the Dominion Telegraph Co., on which he received a dividend of \$18,000. The Dominion Co. was capitalized at \$1,000,000, on which \$253,330 was paid up. Mr. Koper had no doubt that the Western Union had a controlling interest in the G. N. W.

Want C. P. R. Statement. To the C. P. R. lawyers Judge Mabey stated that the statements should go back to the time when the company started business.

Isaac Pitblado asked General Manager Perry why a cable message from Ontario or Montreal to Great Britain cost 23 cents a word, while one from Winnipeg cost only 14 cents a word, or a 10-word cable message from Winnipeg to Montreal costs 90 cents, while the same message by the same distance was only 75 cents. "Difference in the class of business," was the only explanation Mr. Perry could offer.

Commissioner Scott here asked if Mr. Pitblado was not unduly enlarging the scope of the enquiry, and that it was to be confined to the rates of the west.

"My instructions from the government were that it was to constitute a general enquiry," said the western counsel.

"Yes, and thru all this nonsense about general enquiries, I get flummaged into 'tue things' said the chairman amidst laughter.

HYDRO POWER IN TORONTO.

On Tuesday night the hydro-electric power in Toronto will be temporarily turned on. The Sunday World this week carries on its front page a number of views of Toronto's business streets taken after nightfall. These streets, which have the hydro clusters, are fairly ablaze with light, and only a few minutes' exposure was required to make the pictures. WOMAN MURDERED

Found in Woods With Face Beaten in
With a Club.

LAKEWOOD, N.J., April 28.—Mrs. Charles Turner, a pretty brunette of middle age, was found murdered in a wooded place behind a studio building on Fulton-street this afternoon. The woman's face had been beaten in by a big club, which lay nearby, stained with blood.

The body was found by Arnold Turner, her nephew, who was ranging about the country on horseback to-day in search of a hunt. She had been missing since Wednesday, when she left for home on Spruce-street to deliver some dresses which she had made for women inmates of a local sanatorium.

A negro was arrested at Farmingdale late this afternoon on suspicion that he knew something of the murder, but he repudiated an alibi, which satisfied the coroner and prosecutor, and he was allowed to go.

LAKE WATER FLOWS FREELY

Bulk of City's Supply is Now Coming
From This Source.

The city is now getting fully three-fourths of its water supply thru the temporary intake and it is expected that by the first of next week the entire supply will be drawn from this source. In the meantime, there are bulkheads placed right-way up the slope at the first manhole and the shore crib to stop any sand coming thru and centrifugal pumps are kept constantly running both at these points and the temporary intake.

HURRYING HYDRO POLES

One Hundred and Fifty Cement Ones
Being Turned Out Daily.

The city electrical department are at present manufacturing concrete poles at the rate of 150 per day at the Strachan-ave. yards, and will next week start out an extra force erecting poles.

Until the various streets of the city have one row of lights, it is not likely that the work of establishing the second row will be commenced. One reason for this is that the department wishes to be in a position to take over the lighting that is being done on the streets by the Toronto Light Company and this can more readily be accomplished by establishing a partial lighting system first.
