

WILL WAGE BITTER WAR SAYS MRS. PANKHURST

Suffragette Leader Declares Latest Bill "Enfranchising Everything in Trousers" is Last Straw.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 22.—The action of the London police courts in sending suffragettes to prison this morning is the enemy's declaration of war," declared Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, a leader of the militant suffragettes in England, in this city to-day.

"It means that the truce which has been on for a year is ended and a more desperate struggle than ever before is to begin."

Mrs. Pankhurst, mother of Sylvia and Christabel Pankhurst, the latter one of those imprisoned to-day, is touring this country in the interest of woman suffrage. She addressed two meetings to-day and left later for Cincinnati.

"Another 12 hours' developments may show the situation grave enough to call me home," Mrs. Pankhurst said. "The putting of my lieutenants in jail may make it necessary for me to go straight to the front without collecting any more supplies."

"The government's latest bill, automatically enfranchising everything in trousers, which has precipitated the latest developments, by which I have accepted the conciliation bill and granted a truce. It was the best we could get at the time."

"Then came the treacherous action. The government presented its manhood suffrage bill, enfranchising 10,000,000 of the lowest types of men who live of their wives, who prey on other women and have so little political respect that they would not even register as voters. Government officials will seek them out and put them on the register."

Mrs. Pankhurst eagerly welcomed a number of interviewers during her afternoon here, and anxiously sought news from London.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—(C. A. P.)—Unrepentant suffragettes to the number of 223, many of them apparently still in their teens, appeared at Bow-street police court this morning, and were sentenced to fines or alternative terms of imprisonment varying from a fortnight to a month. The women invariably chose prison instead of a fine.

Many of the women are prominent in society as well as being leaders in the women's suffrage movement. Lady Christiana Lytton, sister of Lord Lytton, has been in jail on several occasions since 1903, and caused considerable sensation during one of her sentences by refusing to eat the prison food. Mrs. Evelyn Haverfield, a daughter of Lord Abinger, has also been in jail before for refusing to eat the prison food. Mrs. Pankhurst, editor of "Votes for Women," has been arrested on several occasions.

Counsel for the public prosecutor said to the court that he could not adequately describe "the disgraceful and creditable scenes of organized disorder" of which the accused were guilty last evening.

ADOPTED SON SHARES ESTATE. KINGSTON, Nov. 22.—(Special)—The will of the late Joseph George has been entered for probate. The estate is valued at \$32,452 and the sum of \$4000 goes to the widow while two sisters will each receive \$500. The residue after all bequests are paid goes to Albert Cotterden, electrician, Toronto, an adopted son of the deceased.

The other is to accept the co-operation of the United States, whose bankers will loan the needed money provided that suitable guarantees are given for the security of the loan; in other words, the United States will exercise a vigilant supervision of the customs houses.

President Diaz commended this pact to the National Assembly in no more slender terms than the means of the country's salvation. He expresses complete confidence in the sincerity of the government. He has no fear that the sovereignty and independence of Nicaragua are endangered. He points to Belgium and Switzerland as countries enjoying neutrality under the protection of foreign powers. He cites the city of Cuba and Santo Domingo as experiences that the protection of the United States is secured.

Wallace for alleged breach of promise of marriage. To-day Rev. Thomas H. Mitchell, pastor of New St. James' Presbyterian Church, robbed the court of an interesting case by uniting the contending parties in marriage.

Dr. Jays at Empire Club. The guests of the Empire Club at its luncheon to-day in the St. Charles will be Dr. Tom Jays of Nigeria, who will address the audience on "Problems of Empire in West Africa." Dr. Jays has been in Toronto among the people of the western parts of the dark continent.

BOARDS MURDER BEAUTY AND CULTURE

Street Signs and Posters Severely Reasted by Daughters of the Empire Speaker.

At a meeting of the Daughters of the Empire Society, held yesterday afternoon, in the Margaret Eaton School of Expression, Mrs. W. Hewes Oliphant gave an address on "The Beauty and the Posture of the Body," in which she dealt with the subject from almost every angle and suggested several methods by which the habits and signs of beauty might be cured.

"The first sign which history records," she said, "was placed upon the brow of Cain to mark the first murderer. The glaring signs of to-day mark the murder of all beauty, rural and urban. The advertiser respects no landscape, no charm or dignity of mountain, forest or stream."

The speaker believed that the sign nuisance involved many dangers to the public. It stole the beauty from the places and made no compensation. Its hideous substitutes were insulting. It degenerated standards of taste and lowered the value of the real property by its disfigurements. It involved dangers of fire. It lessened morality, delicacy and refinement, and it enabled the advertiser to sell more of his injurious commodities.

Mrs. Hewes Oliphant believed that a campaign against such a form of advertisement should be taken up by the press and by the papers. Education, however, was, she thought, the best remedy, for if the public could be made to see the vulgarity of such a method of advertising it would be an easy matter to get rid of the nuisance.

DIAZ'S VIEW OF NICARAGUA'S NEED. The message of Don Adolfo Diaz, president of Nicaragua, in which he commended the impending treaty with the country to the National Assembly at Managua, has been published in pamphlet form in English.

President Diaz paints a very unpleasant picture of Nicaragua's poverty and weakness. He lays a great part of the blame for this upon the Zelaya administration, which, "inverted in administrative science," did not understand the situation of the country or know how to improve it. Since this unpopular government could be upheld only by the army which could be kept together only by money, it is impossible, he says, to tell where such a government would have landed the country "if providence had not decreed the fall of Zelaya's regime by means of the revolution" of 1909.

The Zelaya administration is described as bent upon destroying the very sources of national and private wealth. Property was destroyed "with the sole object of inflicting injury upon the adversary." The system of monopolies and concessions to foreigners and favorites is heavily scored.

The evils resulting from this regime are specified in the English translation of notes which may be redeemed at a just and reasonable price; the claims of the Nicaraguans for damages, and "the claims arising from the cancellation of monopolies and concessions" which, the illegal, must be recognized. It is President Diaz's opinion, as stated in the notes, that "Nicaragua cannot correct these evils without negotiating a foreign loan. But here a difficulty arises. The country has been destroyed so that no one has any confidence in the government."

Two alternatives present themselves. One is to wait until the slow action of time has restored things to their natural state before rehabilitating the country. This seems impossible because of the intense and passionate feelings which are attached to the country to enjoy repose.

THE APE-LIKE DWARFS OF THE CONGO. In certain respects the great Congo forest of western Central Africa is the most wonderful region in the world. There are ape-like negroes and curious little Congo dwarfs. These dwarfs are less than five feet high and their behaviour is strangely like that of the brownies and goblins found in fairy stories. Their remarkable power of becoming invisible by drooping behind herbage and rocks; their habit of making a hoarse, rattling noise; their extreme cunning and guile; their supernatural attributes.

These dwarfs are good or bad neighbors to the ordinary negroes according to the treatment they receive. If their depredations on the banana groves, or their occasional thefts of tobacco or maize are ignored, or even if small gifts of food are left where they may easily find them, they will leave in their nightly visitations return gifts of meat or skins or ivory.

These pigmies live entirely by hunting, also they eat wild honey as well as meat. They live separately in tiny huts four feet high, but they are in some respects quite near the apes in their physical characteristics, they are more clever than the larger negroes.

THE WONDERFUL STRENGTH OF HUMAN BONE. Fortunately the human skull, although composed of bones, is elastic—much more so than one would think. The average male adult skull, in fact, is so elastic that it may be compressed laterally in diameter by a blow or by pressure, applied at the centre of the arch, at right angles to the surface, about one-sixth of an inch, recovering its original diameter and form without breakage.

The material of which our bones are made is so highly resistant, states the Scientific American, that a cylindrical piece thereof only one square millimetre or 0.0015 square inch in area has a tensile strength of fifteen kilograms or thirty-three pounds avoirdupois, figuring out at 21,800 per square inch.

A similar sample of hard wood tested in the same manner held only ten kilograms—or, in fact, less than half the strength of the human bone. A single bone fibre is shown in the hygienic exhibition, Dresden, supporting a weight of five kilograms or eleven pounds avoirdupois.

C.N.R. Adds to Rolling Stock. Owing to labor troubles in the coal mines out west, the Canadian Northern supplies by way of Fort Arthur. This, with the tremendous quantities of grain shipments along the company's western lines, has necessitated considerable extra rolling stock. To cope with these difficulties the C. N. R. at the present time have 2023 more cars in western Canada than were used last year.

Will Not Be Fire Trap. E. B. Wood of the building committee in charge of the new Central Y.M.C.A., has taken exception to the fears expressed that the new structure may be a fire trap. He intimates that it will be a first-class building, but it is only a four-story place it will not be all fireproof. The ground floor, elevator shafts, and other sections will be, tho, and the wiring will be in tubes. The cost of the building will be about \$9,000, but if it were fireproof throughout it would, at least, cost 50 per cent. more, says Mr. Wood.
