# VENDOR DIFFERS WITH FLAVELLE

THURSDAY MORNING NOVEMBER 13 1919

Denies Legality of Booking Orders Thru Local Liquor Agent.

James A. Bleakley, a former liquor wendor in the Riverdale district, sends the following communication to The

"I note that Chairman Flavelle of the license commission, in an interview published in an evening paper recently, states: 'Montreal liquor firms are within their rights in receiving orders for liquor shipments to Ontario following the proc.amat.on of peace. Even if such orders are placed thru agents in Ontario, they state, there

is no violation of the law.'
"I beg to differ with the latter opin-Theg to differ with the latter opinion, for in 1916 I was threatened with prosecution for simply giving out a beer order form after the Ontario temperance act became effective, and the official was inspector Pogue of station 3 division, Pape avenue. I mmediately stopped giving out the forms and thereby the prosecution was withdrawn.

"Every liquor dealer in Ontario and Quebec knows, and always understood and was given to understand, that it is unlawful for an order to be placed within this province for liquer. The transaction must be, to come within section 139 of the Ontario temperance act, between a person in this province or a foreign country. Notwithstanding the opinion given, which, to say the least, is a remarkable somersault, at this late stage of the game, anyone detected taking an order, written or verbal, in this province will undoubtedly be fined in any police court in the province. It is only fair to the people who might, in face of the opinion given, innocently do what they never would have done, or thought of doing, had the attonishing statement not been made, and which will certainly add to the present unnest, very mesterially and unnecessarily, that they (the people) be warned not to place an order within the province Section 139, covering the point in question follows:

"While this act is intended to pro-

"While this act is intended to prohibit and shall prohibit transactions
in liquor which take place wholly within the province of Onfario, except
under license or as otherwise specially
provided by this act, and to restrict Ontario and a person in the province of Ontario and a person in another province or in a foreign country, and the provisions of this act shall be construed accordingly."
