To carry out the bylaw faithfully and with satisfaction to the public, it is ne-cessary that discipline should be maintained over the staff employed in order that no injury should result to anyone thru the carelessness of irresponsible employes.

Two Services. "Many complaints have been regis-tered with regard to the drivers which, owing to their independent bearing, it has been found almost impossible to remedy. The services of the liverykeep ers are divided principally into two im-portant divisions, one of which minis-ters to the social requirements of the people in the paying of calls, attending at receptions, etc., and the other with regard to the conducting of funerals and other services of a like nature. "The liverykeepers have put forward their best efforts to satisfy their patrons by turping out upbicles which would be

their best efforts to satisfy their patrons by turning out vehicles which would be a credit to any private owner. In this regard they have looked for but have not secured the co-operation of the drivers who have been the cause of com-plaint from a great many sources. La-dies have reported that these men have been insolent, inattentive' and intoxi-cated while on duty, have left their horses to enjoy a quiet smoke, and have been smoking while driving from place to place. At funerals the men have been repeatedly complained of for leav-ing their boxes during the time of ser-vice and for congregating in the vici-vice and for congregating in the vici-nity of the place where the funeral services are being held and of disturbing the services by unseemly conversation. Object to the Union.

"The most courteous treatment is what is expected of men in this class of help, and certainly up to the present time it has been lacking in many instances.

"The liverykeepers are determined to maintain their service in a high state of efficiency. The introduction of union domination is a condition which threat-ens a continuance of their efficient service. It has been deemed advisable by all the signers of this statement to resist the introduction of a system which has been a failure in other branches of industry, and which would be fatal to their interests and a source of continu-19. SIGN TREATY OF PEACE. Salvador and Nicaragua Come to Honorable Terms.

SAN SALVADOR, Republic of Salvador, April 24 - A treaty of peace between Sal-vador and Nicaragua was signed last night at Amapala by ministers representing each country. The terms of the treaty are honcountry. The terms of the treaty are hon-orable to both countries. The conditions proposed by Salvador were accepted, and the demands made by President Zelaya. of Nicaragua, for reparation for Salvador's part in the recent war between Nicaragua and Honduras, and that there be a free in-terchange of commodities between Nica-ragua and Salvador, were rejected.
