The congregation of the Stone Church is one of the largest and most influential in St. John, and I fancy the "kick" administered to Rev. Mr. de Soyres by the Bishop of Toronto in connection with the rectorship of St. James' will be looked upon with astonishment—not to say indignation—not only by the Stone Church people but throughout the country, although Mr. de Soyres himself, safe in the estimation of his friends, will, under the circumstances, not be much disturbed over the matter. It is currently reported that the Bishop of Toronto has stated that the appointment of Rev. Mr. de Soyres to the rectorship of St. James' would have the effect of driving away a large portion of the congregation, and a Toronto clergyman, whose name is not given, is quoted as making a similar statement. The question at once arises whether such a statement, although made by a bishop or a clergyman, may not be altogether unwarranted.

The fact is that Rev. Mr. de Soyers is not a bishop's favorite. He is noted for having opinions of his own, which are sometimes at varience with those of the bishops, but this has never had the effect of driving away his congregation or of diminishing the esteem in which he is otherwise and more publicly held.

Tower Fell at Six.

Just before 6 o'clock there was a loud and a terride crash, and what was left of the tower fell to the ground, bringing the supports and the red-hot corrugated iron covering with it.
