Back. Cannot Be Located By Police.

Windsor, Feb. 12.—Fred Hardis, a laborer in the employ of John Francis, a farmer on the Tecumseh-road in Sandwich East Township, was shot by this employer on the farm about 11 o'clock this morning. Hardis is said to be fatally injured.

The ball entered the shoulder, and passed downward into the lungs. Immediately after the shooting Francis called to his son and laid an information against him for the charge of manslaughter.

Mr. John Cohen, formerly proprietor of large retail clothing business in Philadelphia, is a greatly wanted man in Boston. Cohen, is under arrest here and his three children are in the city awaiting the disposition of the grand jury. A money obtained by fraud, receiving the stolen property and harboring their mother last night in No. 3 police station, Mr. Cohen will be taken before Judge Smith this morning and probably be remanded for a week to give the authorities of Philadelphia time to prepare, for which it is hoped she will be extradited.

Francis says that he then went into the woods and hid, and that the quarrel continued, and that the man was discharged in a scuffle. Hards was taken to the police station and was released when Dr. Fournier of Tecumseh village came to his assistance.

Francis says that the latter reported the case to Magistrate Bartlett, who advised that Hards be brought to the police station, Windsor, for treatment.

Francis is a well-to-do farmer. He says Hards is now dead, drinking of late. That Hards had been drinking of the intention of the woman to fight the proceedings. Her husband, it is believed, was taken on Monday morning and up to a late hour of the night.

Francis says that he has not heard of her for no trace of his whereabouts. There are claims against him in Philadelphia amounting to upwards of \$20,000.

Robert Hards was a well known manufacturer of clothing in Philadelphia several years ago, and was fairly successful. He was trusted by the wholesale merchants of the city, and his goods were extended to no other dealer. This state of affairs continued till the month of May, when Hards made purchases at wholesale to the amount of \$20,000. In accordance with the usual custom, he was given time to pay, and

KILLED ON THE TRACK.

Hannah K. Cameron Run Down On The Esplanade.
