GETS SUDDENLY RICH.

Dearest Fishmonger Comes Into a Fortune of \$20,000,000.

London, May 22.—A great sensation has been caused in Britain by the news that a fishmonger named O'Rourke has inherited a fortune estimated at \$20,000,000.

A few days ago, Mr. O'Rourke was waiting upon by a gentleman from Georgia, U.S.A., whose mission it was to cross the whereabouts of the heir to the fortune in question.

In 1888 Mr. Page O'Rourke, a native of Drumahair, Leitrim, died in Chicago, leaving a sum of about \$7,000,000, in addition to considerable properties which he owned.

He left no will, but it is represented that there was a note in his diary indicating his intention that the vast wealth he had accumulated should go to the next of kin.

Since his death the value of the estate has increased to some \$20,000,000.

As a result of searching inquiries it has been discovered that Mr. O'Rourke of Belfast is entitled to the extensive fortune, and he has been busy engaged during the week in discovering and preparing documents to prove his credentials.

Mr. O'Rourke is married and has seven children.
