

## WON'T HAVE COLD STORAGE

Board of Control Decides That the Venture Would Prove Unprofitable.

## PAINTING OF EXHIBITION BUILDINGS

Some Small Ones Must Be Sacrificed—Stove Building Not Yet Under Way.

The City of Toronto will not go into the cold storage business. This was the unanimous decision of the Board of Control at its meeting yesterday afternoon. This matter has been under discussion for many months. Reports have been presented and statements prepared on both sides of the question, some showing where the city could make money on the deal and others just as strongly against the proposition on the grounds that there was no possibility of making a cent on the transaction.

Aid. Sheppard made a report last week showing, among other items, that the Toronto Cold Storage Company was at present getting no orders for cold storage of its plant. Yesterday a certificate was given to the city, signed by John Mackay and Company, stating that in an examination of the Cold Storage Company's books they have found the revenue to be on an average of 4 1/2 cents per foot of something over 200,000 cubic feet.

Market Superintendent Frame yesterday reported that the tenants of the market were willing that a plant be put into the market, provided the cost to them would not be over \$10,000, the sum they now pay for ice. The assessment commissioner also reported that the taxes and rent would total \$10,000 per year, and in view of all this, the board decided to recommend the Council to not consider the proposition any further.

## Harris Gets Assesment

Controller Richardson made another attempt to have the basket room in the market leased to the William Harris Company at a yearly rental of \$800, and this time he was successful. The company had on two previous occasions offered \$1200 and \$1500 respectively for the room, but these offers were made under peculiar circumstances, which did not exist at present, and the company would go no higher than \$800.

## Painting of New Buildings

Tenders were opened for painting the new manufacturers' building, and when they were all in it was found that the lowest was for \$7402. As the appropriation for the work was \$4300, the Park Commissioner had to do some fine figuring to overcome the difficulty. He did so by telling the board later in the afternoon that by leaving some of the smaller buildings on the grounds off the painting list for this summer, enough could be saved to do the large job. "Perhaps the board will let us have more money," said the Commissioner. "Never," said Controller Oliver, and the matter was closed.

## City Hall Clock Lighting

The contract for reflectors used for lighting the City Hall clock was awarded to Wheeler and Bain at \$500.

## Stove Building Not Started

Architect Gouinlock wrote to the Mayor complaining of the delay of the contractors in starting work on the new stove building at the Exhibition. The contracts were awarded two weeks ago, he said, and the contractors were supplied promptly with their plans. He had done his best to get the work started, and upon visiting the grounds yesterday he had found the old buildings were not yet removed, and it was impossible for a start to be made. Mr. Gouinlock wants no blame to be placed on him, and it is certainly up to him to have this matter attended to.
