



The heaviest pressure began to be felt on the Carso front Friday. Not only is the main body of the Italian army intact, after having dealt severe blows to the enemy, but it is now apparent that the Italians have thwarted the Austro-German plan of encompassing the third army in the Carso, thereby cutting off the flower of the forces in this region, rendering the Venetian Plains defenceless and encouraging the hope of the enemy for a decisive victory with far-reaching political results.
