Making Preparations for Bout With Dempsey.

Kansas City, Dec. 17.-Jess Willard former heavyweight champion, expects to train intensively three months in preparation for his bout to regain the title from Jack Dempsey in New York on March 27, according to a statement made here by Ray Archer, his manager.

Archer came to Kansas City from Lawrence, Kas., the home of the former champion, to confer with Hugh Walker, a heavyweight, concerning the employment of Walker as one of Willard's ment of Walker as one of Willard's sparring partners. Walker will meet Capt. Bob Roper, heavyweight, in a bout here December 30. According to Archer, Willard has already begun to train, although his work is somewhat handicapped because his home is quarantined on account of illness in his family. Archer said Willard expects to have several sparring partners, and that he would make every effort to obtain well-known fighters. Discussing the coming hout with Dempsey, Archer said: "Willard is not thinking about money. He wants to prove to the public that he was not himself at Toledo."

The leading pitcher of the year was Robert Shawkey of New York, who worked in 38 games, 267 innings, and allowed but 73 runs for an average of 2.46 for each full game of nine innings. Stanley Coveleskie, premier hurler of the champion Cleveland team, was second with an earned run average of 2.48. Coveleskie appeared in 41 battles, worked 315 innings, and allowed 87 runs. Urban Shocker, St. Louis, followed the Indian star with a 2.71 average, gained in 38 games, 246 innings, in which opponents counted 74 times.


