WOULD HELP THE CITY MAN GET "BACK TO THE LAND"

Governor of Washington State Proposes a Commission to Improve Rural Life

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 6.—To relieve the congestion of the cities, make life attractive for the present residents of the rural districts and to increase the productivity of every acre of tillable land in America is the object of a commission to be organized by Governor M. E. Hay of Washington, in requesting President C. M. Fassett of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce to appoint a committee of educators, business and professional men to formulate a practical working plan for the country life movement inaugurated by former President Roosevelt.

In his letter to President Fassett, Governor Hay says: "I am firmly convinced that there are more dissatisfied people in the cities than in the country. It is not the adult population of the country which is lured to the city, but the younger generation attracted by the glare and glimmer of better material, more leisure, less hardship and more social advantages. The city man in his wisdom, brain and body weary of the maelstrom of strenuous commercialism, looks longingly at the green fields, the rivers and the hills, and the fresh air, and the life of the country. It is my desire that you appoint a committee to formulate a practical working plan whereby these conditions will be so changed that the country life will be attractive alike to the tired city man and the younger generation. Farming must be made a business and that business will soon become a pleasure. Every year the city demands its toll of humanity from the soil. In thousands of thousands and demands more. It is our plain duty to repay a part of that debt and to return to the country a large portion of the men and women who have been sacrificed upon the altar of greed."

When the committee makes its report, which is expected shortly, Governor Hay will appoint a chairman of education and inspect the work of a permanent organization which promises to be one of the most far-reaching and important movements in the history of America. Notorious Chief Says He Killed Gendarmes Like Sparrows

LONDON, Feb. 5.—There is much interesting country still to be explored in Europe, as was shown by the Rev. T. J. Norgate in a lecture he delivered before the Royal Geographical Society, which he opened with a review of the progress of the Englishman who has crossed the highest peaks of the high Carpathians, living between Hungary and Poland. During the two months' tour in the district he passed through the home of the gypsies, he said. There were three classes of gypsies. Some of the finest music he had ever heard was by the gypsies. 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Pastor Russell's Sermon

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Feb. 6.—The fourth and final meeting for the consideration of doctrinal surrenders necessary to church federation was held to-day, Brooklyn's largest auditorium, the Academy of Music, being crowded. Pastor T. C. Russell of the Brooklyn Tabernacle delivered the address as follows:

Having viewed during the past three Sundays what the leading denominations would need to sacrifice in the interests of federation, we come to-day to the final discussion.
