Pieces Together Evidence of Bullets to Show How Merkt Killed Wife and Then Himself.

Most of the material facts concerning the alleged murder of Monday after-noon last of Louise Merkt at her home, 10 Robert-street, followed immediately by the suicide of the husband, were adduced last evening by the jury under Coroner Young at the undertaking parlors of John D. McGill, 282 College-

Miss Charlotte Merkt, a daughter, altho in a very nervous state, gave a clear description of the awful scene which awaited her on her arrival home

clear description of the awful scene which awaited her on her arrival home for lunch on Monday. On approaching the house she said that she detected an odor as of something burning, and running thru to the back of the house, she found her mother stretched out in the back doorway.

"As mother had a club foot, I had always been in constant dread on coming home, to find that she had failen and injured herself. Accordingly, when first I saw her, I believed that she had simply fallen and fainted; but in a moment I discovered the pool of blood beside her, and almost immediately I seemed to imagine the detail of what had happened as they were afterwards told to me. At the time I was afraid that father might still be lurking near somewhere in the house, and hearing someone descending the front staircase, I endeavored to get to the front door before father, for I believed he would try to get me. It was Mr. Clark, however, who had roomed with us in the house for about two years, and I exclaimed: "My God, has father been here?"

"He replied that he did not know, and as we stood in the doorway leading into the drawing room, he turned half around and saw the image in the mirror of someone lying on the parlor floor, and remarked that that was probably him in there."

Miss Merkt stated that she had always understood that her father had been committed to the Toronto Asylum in May last by the authorities. Since the time of his committial she had not seen him. Since was not aware of the fact that he had been around the house during the last four monthe until Monday, aitho she believed that he had visited her sister's home once at 119 D'Arcy-street.

Hex father had purchased a revolver when she was a little girl as a protection for her mother, as he was often away from home for periods at a time. Her mother had hidden this long ago, after her father had shown many signs of a violent temper. He had never heard thim make threats. Mrs. Merkt was very kind and peacebelo.

Mrs. Merkt was very kind and peace-Chief Coroner Johnson, who conduct Chief Coroner Johnson, who conducted the post-mortem, said: "Merkt evidently fired the first shot at his wife while she was standing in the kitchen. This penetrated on the right cheek between the eye and the ear. She evidently turned to run, and fell face downward in the doorway. Merkt then fired another shot into the back of his wife's neck.

Turning in full view of the mirror this time, he fired the second shot, which proved instantaneonsly fatal."

Charges Be Reduced and Made Uniform For Service.

SPRINGFIELD, Ills., Aug. 30.-The big express companies of the country were dealt the most severe blow of their existence Saturday afternoon when the Illinois railroad and warehouse commission promulgated an order cutting in half many of the rates now charged by the companies and making sweeping reductions ail along the line. The state commission orders that the schedule of rates fixed by it shall become effective on Oct. 15.

This is the first attempt ever made in Illinois to control the rates charged by the express companies and the companies already have announced their intention to fight it thru the court of last resort.

court of last resort. The commission's action is based upon an opinion given by Attorney-General Stead over a year ago to the effect that the express companies are common carriers and that the Illinois statutes give the railread and warehouse commission authority to control them. From the investigation and the re-cord the commission draws the folcwing conclusions:

First—That the returns from the

capital employed in the operation of express service by the express companies in the state is excessive. Second—That the rates and charge made by the express companies, which yield these excessive returns upon the capital actually and necessarily employed in the express business, should be reduced to a basis which should bring a fair remuneration on a fair value of the actual pro-

perty employed in the business.

Third—That the present basis of rates, besides being excessive, is in many instances discriminatory, as it imposes varying charges for the same

Fourth—The transportation charges should be based upon the distance and graduated in proportion to weight.

Fifth—That terminal charges should
