ANZACS BATTLING HARD FOR FULL POSSESSION OF POZIERES CANNONADING ALONG THE BRITISH FRONT DEVELOPS GREAT INTENSITY DEADLOCK AT HOME RULE ISSUE REACHED IN BRITISH PARLIAMENT

HOLD UPON POZIERES TIGHTENED BY ANZACS

Curtain of Fire Hides Ruins of Village, Where Australians Are Battling for Complete Mastery—Volume of Shelling by Both Sides is Tremendous.

LONDON, July 24, 11.20 p.m.—The struggle for the possession of Pozieres still continues, with the Anzac troops tightening their hold on the large part of the village held by them. Tonight's report from Sir Douglas Haig says: "The fighting has continued in the Village of Pozieres, where the number of prisoners taken by the Australian troops has reached a total of six officers and 145 other ranks."

General Haig today sent the following telegram to the Australian Government: "Part of the first Australian division made a very gallant, skilful and successful attack on Pozieres Village, a very strong point in the enemy's line, and captured two guns and some prisoners with slight loss."

AGREEMENT ON HOME RULE IS STILL REMOTE

Asquith Tells Redmond Measure Cannot Be Introduced at Present.

LONDON, July 24.—Indications of the failure of the negotiations on the Irish settlement initiated by Lloyd George and that the tentative home rule measure has been dropped for a time at least, were given in today's debate in the house of commons.

Where They Divide. The rock upon which negotiations have been wrecked is the retention in the imperial parliament of Nationalist members in unreduced numbers.

Asquith's Appeal. A significant remark was made by Premier Asquith in appealing to the Nationalists not to throw away the opportunity for bringing home rule to immediate operation.

Keen Disappointment. The situation in Ireland remains where it was, with the additional factor of the unrest brought about by the disappointed hopes of a settlement of the issue.

TEUTONS SAY PRAYERS FOR DEUTSCHLAND

Minister Holds Service for Merchant Submarine, Half Submerged.

BALTIMORE, July 24.—A communion service was held tonight aboard the interned North German Lloyd steamer Neckar, lying alongside the submarine Deutschland, for the captain and crew of the submarine.

LONDON, July 25, 5.15 a.m.—A despatch to the Morning Post from Budapest, dated July 15, says: "Some Cossack detachments succeeded in crossing into Hungary yesterday, creating a panic thruout the frontier towns and villages and causing thousands of refugees to swarm down on to the plains. The Russians rapidly withdrew, fighting continuous with detachments of gendarmes."

Journalists who have seen the exodus in the Bukovina region say that only the Serbian flight into Montenegro and Albania can be compared to it. Everywhere are to be seen bodies of persons who died from exhaustion and disease.

ALL FOR NICKEL REFINING IN CANADA NOW

What a rush there is to get into the nickel refining business since The World trained its guns on the International Nickel Trust and on the governments at Ottawa and Toronto! And to refine it in Ontario!

The International gave a kind of supercilious undertaking to Sir Robert Borden some months ago that in due time they might start to refine a portion of their product in Canada—somewhere down on the Nova Scotia coast—where chemicals were cheap; where there was sea water and other requisites.

So things may be done. But Mr. Ferguson is so sure that no Canadian nickel is getting to Germany. We are not so sure; one thing, however, we are sure of, and that is that Germany has been, thru her agents, storing up in the States her full share of the nickel turned out by the International.
