Salonica as friends of both Greece and Serbia, he said. Their sole desire was to prevent Greece from becoming enmeshed in the Germanic net...

Declaring that the entente allies were in hearty sympathy with Eleutherios Venizelos, former premier, Mr. Asquith asked how Greece could possibly stand aloof from a war for the emancipation of smaller states.

Dealing with the general situation, Mr. Asquith said: "Let there be no illusion about our enemies. They are great organizers and fine fighters in the field. They are also if not skilful in the use of propaganda, they have a double motive—to divide the allies and capture neutral opinion."

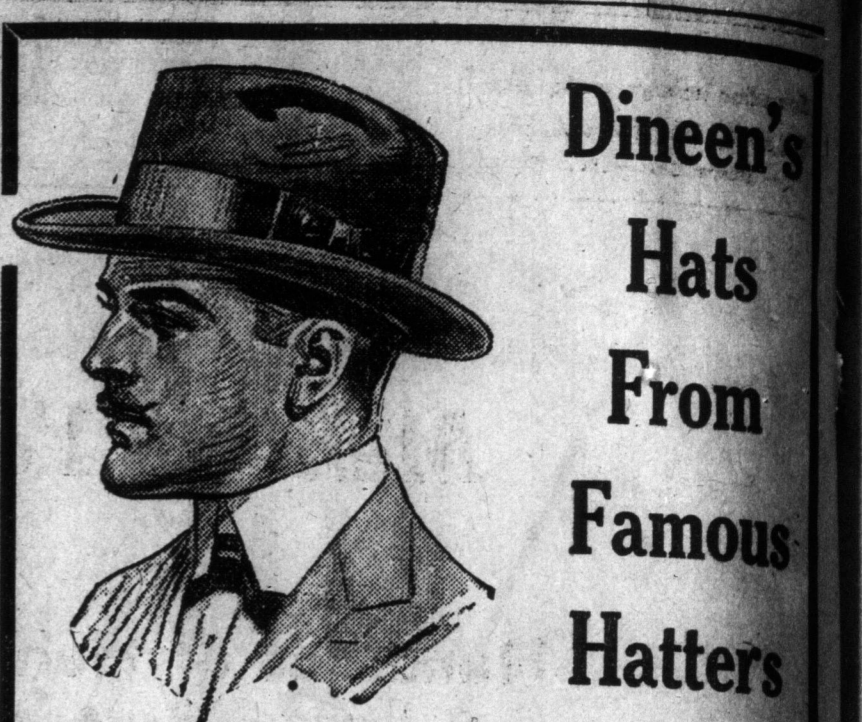
Mr. Newman, in his quoted official government figures, stating that there was over four hundred million dollars worth of goods exported last year over the preceding year.

WAR SUMMARY

THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

German artillery violently bombarded the Douaumont-Vaux sector and the French guns made adequate reply.

Excepting the discharge of gas against the Germans in the region of Armentieres, the British had nothing unusual to report on their front in France yesterday. Twenty-two tons of explosives were taken from a dug-out captured by the Canadians in a recent advance, according to the British war office.

The Germans are said by some persons, not admiralty officials, to have sent many submarines thru the English Channel during the recent raid on the sea communications of the British transport to the continent. These have been sniping ships off the southern coast of France and in the channel. The admiralty has greatly strengthened its patrol fleet and hopes to capture all of these. It is possible, however, that with the long cruising qualities of these craft, many of these have sailed round the coast of Ireland.

By putting the torch to Hirsowa before withdrawing, Von Mackensen shows his belief that he will not come back in the Dobrudja. The allies are some 25 miles of Cernavoda and presumably about the same distance from Constanta, and it is yet uncertain whether Von Mackensen will defend retreatment until he arrives in Bulgaria or whether he will continue his will attempt a stand in the near future, if only to test the strength of the allied advance. Across Roumania from the Dobrudja, the Russians are becoming heavily engaged south of Dorna Watra. The Roumanians have won a success in the Buzeu Valley. On the rest of the Transylvanian front they continue to withstand the German attack.
