NICHOLSON REFUSES TO SIGN U.S. SENATE PEACE RESOLUTION

REMARKABLE ATTACK ON "MOVIE" SHOWS IN FEDERAL HOUSE

LEMIEUX ON TARIFF

Ottawa, May 27. — (By Canadian Press.) — A brisk battle over morning and Saturday sittings preceded resumption of the budget debate in the house today. There was washing of "dirty linen in public," as Dr. Clark of Red Deer put it. A western member complained that Quebec and Ontario members got home for the weekend and left westerners to form a quorum. The charge was heatedly denied after some sparring back and forth. The motion for additional sittings went over for the time being.

BOLSHEVIKI WANT POLES CALLED OFF

Until Then, Will Not Admit Commission of the League of Nations. London, May 27.—The recent communication sent by Sir Eric Drummond, secretary of the league of nations, to the Russian soviet government, expressing regret that the Moscow authorities had set up conditions tantamount to a refusal to permit an investigating committee of the league to visit soviet Russia, has been answered by M. Tchitcherin, the soviet commissary for foreign affairs.

TRIPLE ALLIANCE TO BE CONSULTED

Action of Irish Railway Men Embarrasses the National Union. London, May 27.—The executive of the National Union of Railwaymen has issued a statement that it considers the whole question has been made difficult in Ireland by the refusal of the members of the organization to handle munitions or assist in any military operations. The executive has confirmed its resolution on Friday, to submit the question to a full meeting of the triple alliance—miners, railwaymen and transport workers—which is being immediately reconvened. In the meantime, the members have been instructed to do nothing to prejudice full consideration of the whole case by that body.

FIX PRICE OF IRISH WHISKEY AT FORTY CENTS A GLASS

Dublin, May 27.—The chief secretary for Ireland today received at the department of the Licensed Grocers and Vintners' Association, who wanted sanction to fix the price of whiskey in the future. After a consultation it was agreed to fix the price at 20 pence per glass.

OVER QUARTER MILLION ASKED TO CARRY OUT PROVISIONS OF ONTARIO TEMPERANCE ACT

Provincial Secretary Nixon Gives Details of Estimates of Board of License Commissioners—Vendors Do Business of About Four Million Dollars a Year.

The protest of Liberal Leader H. H. Dewar against the practice of asking for lump sums for public services and not giving details of them in the legislative estimates bore fruit in the legislature yesterday. To an item of \$254,000, for the enforcement of the Ontario temperance act, Mr. Dewar promptly took objection to the lack of details. Chicago, May 27.—Railroad employees of the United States must be granted prompt wage increases regardless of cost to the carriers, or the entire railway industry will face complete disruption, W. N. Doak, vice-president of the brotherhood of railway trainmen, declared today before the railroad labor board which is conducting hearings into the demands of the employees.

LEGISLATURE HAS BLIND EYE FOR COAL SITUATION

No Steps Taken to Prevent Shortage Facing Ontario Industry. LEFT TO COMMISSION. Also the coal situation in Ontario is at the present time distinctly bad. It is likely to become worse as the winter gets nearer. No one in authority except H. A. Harrington, the fuel controller, seems to be taking much interest in the matter. The Ontario legislature has been sitting for some months now, and not one word has been uttered by either cabinet ministers or private members concerning the seriousness of the present, past or future coal situation.

MARBLE MONUMENT TO COL. BAKER, M.P.

Recommend That Handsome Memorial Be Placed in Ottawa Buildings. Ottawa, May 27.—(Canadian Press.)—The special committee of parliament appointed to consider the form of the memorial to the late Lieut.-Col. G. H. Baker, M.P., recommends that a monument in marble of about 6 feet 6 inches in height, and representing Col. Baker in uniform, shall be placed on a pedestal four feet in height. The monument will bear the inscription: "Lieut.-Col. George Harold Baker, M.P., 5th Mounted Rifles. Killed in Battle on June 2, 1916. Erected by order of the Parliament of Canada. The cost of the monument will be in the neighborhood of \$12,000.

BRITAIN AND RUSSIA TO REACH TERMS?

Important Conference is About to Open in London. Montreal, May 27.—A London cable to The Montreal Star says: "The possibilities hinge upon the success or failure of conferences about to take place between members of the British government and representatives of Soviet Russia, some of whom are already in London."

FLOUR AND WHEAT AGAIN GO HIGHER

Minneapolis, May 27.—A higher wheat market the past two days was reflected in an advance of 25c a barrel for flour at one of the mills here today. Family patents in carload lots in 98-pound cotton sacks were quoted at \$14.85 a barrel at this place.

DESCHANEL MUST REST

Paris, May 27.—President Deschanel, after passing an excellent night, was visited this morning by his physicians. While they found the president was progressing satisfactorily, the doctors insisted on the necessity of a complete rest.

PRESIDENT VEToes RESOLUTION DECLARING PEACE WITH GERMANY VOTE TO OVERRULE HIM TODAY

Wilson Declares It Would Mean Complete Surrender of Rights of U. S. Chance of Two-Thirds Vote to Override Veto Are Slim—Will Be Fought Out in Presidential Campaign. Washington, May 27.—President Wilson vetoed the peace resolution today and informed congress he could not become a party to the peace program framed by Republican leaders of the senate and house because he considered it would put "an inalienable stain on the nation's honor."

WOMEN ASSURED OF LIVING WAGES BY THIS MEASURE

Legislature Gives Final Reading to Minimum Wage Board Bill. WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION. The final reading in the legislature last night of the bill to provide for a minimum wage board with power to regulate in certain cases the minimum wages of women and girls is one of the useful pieces of social legislation for which credit must be given to the Labor group of the house. It becomes effective in July.

EXPLOSION KILLS GERMAN STUDENTS

London, May 27.—An explosion during experiments in the chemical laboratory of Muenster University resulted in the death of six students, says a wireless message from Berlin. Several others were seriously injured.

ONLY TEN AGAINST GOVERNMENT WHEN HOUSE IS DIVIDED

By Vote of 64 to 10, Legislature Passes Superannuation Bill. SIX U.F.O. BOLTERS. The legislature divided yesterday afternoon on the third reading of the premier's bill to superannuate civil servants. It was passed by a vote of 64 to 10. The Conservative and Labor groups voted solidly for the measure, while six U.F.O. supporters and four Liberals voted against it.

RACING MAGNATES APPROVE OF TAX

Leading Owners Consider Imposition on Tracks Justified by Results. Prophecy has apparently proved erroneous as far as the future of horse racing in Ontario is concerned. Pessimistic gentlemen and others who normally look upon the bright side of life, were unanimous some weeks ago in stating that the new government tax of \$7500 a day on mile race tracks would put the "sport of kings" out after five days of racing at the Woodbine track setting abnormal records in attendance—the pessimists are gradually admitting that perhaps racing may continue, and the optimists declare that its future is assured.

CONSTABLES AMBUSHED BY MASKED SINN FEINERS

Belfast, May 27.—A sergeant and a constable were ambushed today by masked men near Seilmannagh, county Lagan. They fired when they were ordered to hand over their arms, and wounded two of the men in the ambush. The sergeant was not hurt. Thereupon the raiders took the policemen's arms and made their escape.

KING ALEXANDER RETURNS TO HIS KINGDOM SOON

Paris, May 27.—King Alexander of Greece, who is now in London, will return to his capital upon the conclusion of his visit here. It was announced at the Greek legation today. This announcement sets at rest the recently published rumors that the king had decided to share the exile of his father, ex-King Constantine, and that he might be succeeded on the Greek throne by an English prince.

CONSTITUTIONAL REFORM, NEW NAME FOR UNIONISTS

Ottawa, May 27.—(Canadian Press.)—It was learned on good authority tonight that one name to be submitted to the caucus of government supporters when it meets next week will be "The Constitutional Reform Party." Members who discussed it this afternoon were practically unanimous in their opinion that the change would be the almost unanimous consent of the caucus.
